CITY COUNCIL AFTER THE SIDEWALK SKATERS AGAIN

At the city council meeting Tuesday-morning, the council in session asked that the Headlight call attention to the fact that the city ordinance against skating, riding bicycles and velocipedes on the sidewalks is going to be rigidly enforced. Once or twice before the council has asked the Headlight to call attention to this ordinance, and for a time the skating and riding of bicycles on the walks was discontinued. But, according to the council, the matter soon blows over and the children of the town are violating this ordinance again. Within the last few days a number of complaints have been made to the mayor and city councilmen, complaints of skating and riding bicycles on the sidewalks. The skaters, so those complaining to the council state, give the sidewalk for no one, and if you don't take a "siding" when you see them coming—well, you'll wish later you had. And others have complained to the council about the skaters skating in front of their homes late into the night thus disturbing their sleep. This is the last warning the city council expects to give on this subject. Such an ordinance exists on the city's books and it is going to be enforced.
