S. Simmons and R. E. Walker. The woman, Pannie McHenry, who received three pistol wounds, is doing as well as could be expected. In the absence of County Attorney A. A. Gregory at the examining trial, the State was represented by Attorney W. M. Williamson and the defendant by A. J. Wirtz of the law firm of Strickland & Wirtz.

John H. Kirby, Planning to Make Pleasure Resort Down at the Lake.

An agreement has been reached between the attorneys, by which the suit of John H. Kirby, against the Lakeside Rice Mill Co. for land fronting on Eagle Lake, was compromised. According to the terms of the settlement Mr. Kirby gets five acres of land fronting on the lake at the old location of the Danovant electric pumping plant, where the boat house is now situated, and a sixty-foot strip of land for road purposes.

Heading from the five acres to the Lakeside public road, along the north line of the Lakeside cemetery. Mr. Kirby obligates himself to place certain improvements on the five acres within an agreed length of time, for the purpose of developing the lake as a hunting, and fishing preserve, and the rice mill agrees to remove the slaughter pen now on the premises and to prohibit a slaughter pen from ever being maintained in its nature on the premises.

Just what character of improvements will be erected by Mr. Kirby has not yet been decided. It is understood, however, that Mr. Kirby intends to form a corporation with his Houston friends, giving such Eagle Lake citizens as desire the privilege of becoming stockholders, for development purposes; and if Mr. Kirby's ideas are carried out, Eagle Lake will be improved to such an extent that it will have no equal as an inland pleasure resort in the state. The Pierce Hardware Company this week received the following correspondence from A. M. Penton of Barrow in Furness, England:

"I should be greatly obliged if you would find Willie Westmoreland, Eagle Lake, Texas, and give him the enclosed. He sent a parcel of nuts and toys in the Santa Claus ship. The bag containing them had your firm name printed on it, and this is the reason that I am notifying you."

"Dear Willie: I hope this letter will find you for you were so kind to send a parcel in the Santa Claus ship. I have been helping take the various toys and other presents to the children of our soldiers who are fighting for the old country. You will see that yours was given to a little girl whose father was killed in France. Strange that your parcel should come so near the Westmoreland in England, where we too have lakes, but not Eagle Lake. Ours, I expect, would seem very small and insignificant to you. Still they are very beautiful and we love our hills and lake country. I thought that you would like to hear that your kindness was appreciated, so I asked the little girl to write to you. If you get this letter you will be so kind as to send a post card to me. Yours sincerely, A. M. Penton, 3 St. George's Sq., Barrow in Furness, England."

The letter from the little girl, is written in childish hand, as follows:

"Dear Willie: I am writing to thank you for your kindness in sending the parcel, which we received, also to thank the little girl who sent the doll and little red jacket for our baby sister. She was born three weeks after her father went to the war, and she will never see him, for he was killed on October 29th. This is a terrible war, and we will all be glad when it is over, as many brave men are giving their lives for their country. Once more thanking you for myself and little sister and wishing you all happiness and prosperity in the coming year, I am, yours truly, Eva Livingston, aged 9."
