

## Seniors Won Track Meet at High School Over Juniors.

Last Friday afternoon the senior and junior classes of the Eagle Lake high school met on the school grounds in a track and field meet. The seniors were represented by Maynard Landa and John Hefley, while the juniors were represented by Wayne Middleton, John Hefley, Malcolm Williamson and Heryn Nussbaum.

The girls of the two classes were quite active, as were witnessed by the tastefully decorated box, prepared by the seniors and the daily decorated auto that brought the juniors to the field of battle. Class spirit is strong and every effort was made that would aid the representatives. Class songs and yells, and other nerve wrecking devices were in use.

The slow rain that was falling made the ground slippery and prevented the boys from doing as well as they are capable of doing.

The pole vault was close and exciting. It was won by Buffington of the juniors over Hefley of the seniors. Height 7 ft. 7 in.

Landa of the seniors came back at the juniors by walking away with the 100-yard dash. Time 11 seconds.

Hefley of the seniors then won the high jump, height 4 ft. 7 in.

The running broad jump also went to Hefley, although Nussbaum was a close second. Distance 15 ft. 9 in.

The juniors began to look worried, but rallied when Middleton won the shot-put. 32 ft. 6 in.

Landa then easily won the standing high jump. 4 ft. 1 in.

Next came the hop, skip and jump, which was won by Hefley. 32 ft. 3 in.

This assured the seniors of the meet and called forth a great cheer from their followers, while the juniors continued to root with energy.

Landa won the standing broad jump, 9 ft. 10 in.

Last came the mile run in which the juniors expected a walk away. Landa, Hefley, Williamson and Buffington entered, but only the seniors finished. Landa in about 6 minutes and Hefley shortly after.

The seniors took seven of the nine events.

A general school meet is being held today (Friday). The school has some good material that has not been tried out, and it is very likely that all of these records will be beaten. Over-training and the cold rainy weather put a crimp on the boys last week. The track suits failed to keep them warmed up sufficiently to do good work. On next Friday the boys of the town are to meet the school boys.

Demonstration Agent Kolberg visited Wharton last Monday and assisted Agent Bagwell of that county in administering serum to a herd of hogs for hog cholera prevention. So far Mr. Kolberg has been able to discover no cases of hog cholera in Colorado county. Recently, however, some cases were reported as near as Bonus. From information gained by Mr. Kolberg at Wharton it seems that the hog cholera was first reported in that county at the extreme south border about two years ago. The infection has gradually worked up to near the northern border, and there is danger that it may infect hogs in this county unless preventive measures are taken. These consist of clean pens, sprayed with stock dip solution, shelter from wet and cold during northers, and good feed or pastures. In Wharton county war is being waged on bozzards and dogs, as these are known to be largely responsible for the spread of both hog cholera and charbon, causing losses among livestock amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars in the Gulf states alone.

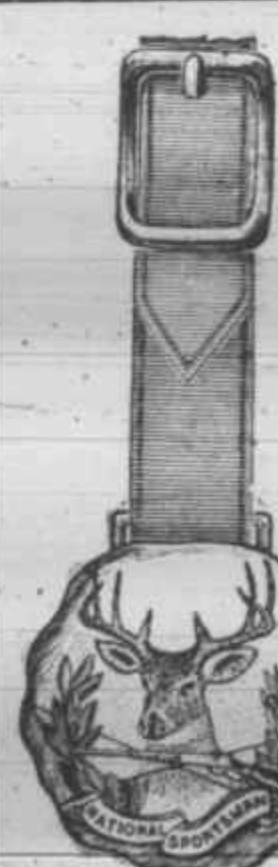
