St. Louis February 5.—Testimony that a judge cutting war inaugurated by the Corn Products company resulted in the sale of a glucose factory at Granite City Ill., was given here today at the hearing in the government dissolution suit against the Corn Products Refining company.

The testimony was given by Oscar Winterman of Eagle Lake, Texas, son of the former president of the St. Louis Syrup and Preserving company, which built the Granite City factory.

He said that the factory was established to relieve the difficulty of getting glucose which prevailed after the organization of the Corn Products Refining company in 1902.
