5050 PALM IN COLUMBUS IN BLOOM AND WENT TO SEED

The Headlight editor returns thanks to Mr. A. S. Lowrey of Columbus for a number of Sago Palm seed. The Sago is one of the most beautiful palms, and a rapid grower. This palm at the Lowrey home in Columbus bloomed and went to seed, being only the second palm known to have bloomed and gone to seed in Texas. There were several hundred of the seed which are red in color and about as large as a hickory nut. From these seed it is said that the palms will grow faster and thrive better than if larger palms were gotten and set out. Mr. Lowrey is selling these seed at three for a quarter and is receiving orders from almost everywhere. If you want any of the seed send Mr. Lowrey a quarter and 5c extra for postage, and he will mail you the seed. Plant them now. They will come up later in the spring. Plant them in large pots and leave the young palms in the pot in which they are planted for two years before transplanting to the yard.

TAX ASSESSOR ASKS THAT PEOPLE MEET HIM HERE

In this issue of the Headlight will be found a complete list of the different places and dates which will be visited by Tax Assessor Henry J. Laas of Columbus on his annual tax assessing rounds. Mr. Laas says it is very important that the tax payers meet him in person in order to have their property accurately assessed in value as well as description. Mr. Laas informs us that at all of the places through out the county he gets at least ninety percent of the assessments while on this round, with the exception of the Eagle Lake Justice Precinct No. 8, and as a consequence the majority of tax payers here have more or less trouble in paying their taxes. This, of course, is annoying to both the tax collector and the tax payer. Mr. Laas is going to the expense of running a large advertisement in the Eagle Lake paper that the people of this section may properly be notified of his dates here. He especially urges that you see him in person and have your taxes properly assessed when he is here. If you fail to see Mr. Laas when he visits Eagle Lake for the purpose of properly assessing taxes, then you will have no one to blame but yourself when it comes to paying your taxes, and you are having more or less trouble about it.

New Game Law.

A new game law that should be passed by all States would contain the following:
