RECEIVERS APPOINTED FOR THE SIMPSON BANK

Len R. McFarlane of Houston and W. S. Miller of Columbus, Colorado county, were appointed receivers Thursday by Judge Waller T. Burns of the federal district court for the Simpson bank of Columbus following a writ issued by the court declaring the bank, French Simpson and Carey Shaw, owners, bankrupt. The action of the court followed the filing by Mr. Simpson of an answer to a petition that was filed with the clerk of the federal court at Houston January 20 by J. J. Odom, Lavo Hester and others. In the petition it was stated that an act of bankruptcy had been committed, alleging that the bank had executed an assignment. The bond of the receivers was fixed at \$25,000, jointly, and both receivers qualified at once.
