

FUNERAL OF L. M. WIRTZ IN COLUMBUS THIS AFTERNOON

Mr. L. M. Wirtz died at half past seven o'clock Thursday morning at the home of his son, Mr. A. J. Wirtz, on Main street in this city, following a long illness.

Mr. Wirtz was one of Colorado county's old and honored citizens. He was born in Salem, Roanoke county, Virginia, on June 13th, 1854, and with his family moved to Texas the same year, arriving in Columbus on Christmas day, and has continued to make Columbus his home from that time up to a year ago, when his health failed him and he came to be with his son in this city. Mr. Wirtz was a good man and a splendid citizen. He was popular with all who knew him; his gentle, quiet and unassuming manner always winning friends for him wherever he went. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World Lodge for more than twenty years.

The deceased is survived by a brother, Mr. Jake Wirtz of Columbus, and two sons, A. J. and Milton Wirtz of this city, the latter attending the State University at Austin, arriving here this morning for the funeral.

The remains were shipped to Columbus on the half past two o'clock train this afternoon, and interment will be made at that place immediately after arrival of the train there.

To the bereaved relatives the Headlight extends its sincerest sympathy.


