Virginia was being reproved by her mother for the lack of table manners she had shown at the dinner table.

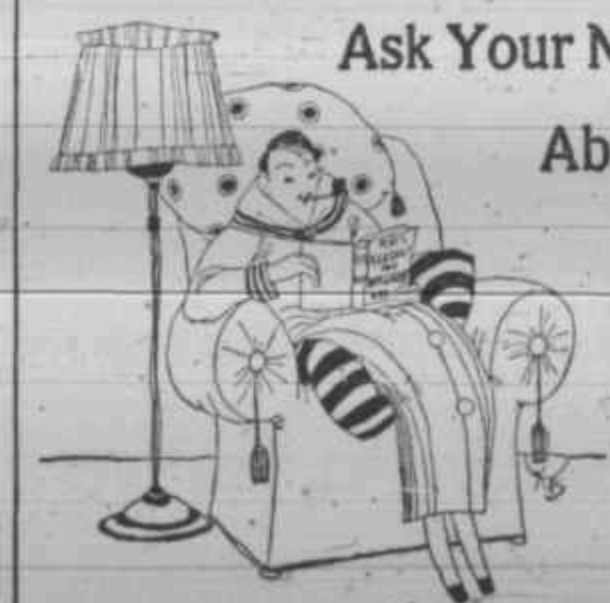
"Where were your table manners, Virginia?" her mother asked.
