## Court News

Whereas Otto Uhlig has been  
permitted to erect a gate on the  
outgoing and Freishurg 2nd  
class public road No. 76, and  
whereas there is a demand to  
have said road again opened, it is  
therefore ordered that the Clerk  
issue notice to Mr. Uhlig to have  
said gate and obstruction removed  
from the said road on or before  
the 1st day of May, A. D. 1915.

The Court went in a body to  
view a part of the road between  
Garwood and Eldridge.

In the matter of Colorado  
County drainage, district No. 2,  
it appearing to the court that the  
petition for the establishment of  
said district filed in this court  
on the 7th day of December, 1914,  
is insufficient in law for the es-  
tablishment of a district, and  
that said petition contains an in-  
correct description of this dis-  
trict, it is therefore ordered by  
the court establishing said dis-  
trict and all other proceedings in  
said matter to date be, and the  
same are hereby held for naught,  
and said orders are in things set  
aside, rescinded and held for  
naught.

per, Aug. Becker, R. Schertz, D.  
Richter and D. Meyer, to lay out  
and mark said road and report  
their action to the next regular  
term of this court.

In the matter of the petition of  
Ben Kansteiner et al for the es-  
tablishing of a second class pub-  
lic road beginning in the Colum-  
bus, Freishurg and Brenham  
first class public road, and to in-  
tersect the Alleyn and Freish-  
burg first class public road, the  
court appointed the following  
jury of view, to-wit: H. Weishuhn,  
B. Cansteines, C. Henneke, A.  
Moeller and F. Henneke, for them  
to lay out said road and report  
their action to this court at the  
next regular term thereof.

The report of the jury of view  
heretofore appointed upon the  
petition of R. Habel et al for the  
laying out of a 2nd class public  
road, beginning at the extreme  
southern end of road No. 134  
thence southward and to inter-  
sect road No. 150, came on for  
consideration by the court, and  
was adopted, and ordered estab-  
lished.

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
