City Election Proclamation.

McCreary, whose respective terms of office will have expired on that date, and to elect one city attorney for the ensuing two years, to succeed Emanuel Roos, whose term of office will have expired on that date.

Said election to be held at the Mayor's office in the city of Eagle Lake, Texas, which said election shall be held in conformity with the laws of the State of Texas governing general elections. I hereby nominate and appoint Wm. Falen as presiding officer of the said election and hereby give him full authority to select such judges and clerks as may be necessary to help hold said election.
