We expect to have the new press in operation with- in a month or six weeks, and ere this year closes we expect to have added a linotype to our equipment. For some time we have been considering this im- provement, and have decided that in order to give Eagle Lake the high grade newspaper that we want to, it will be necessary to make these improvements. We are aware of the fact that it is quite an investment in the print- ing business for a town the size of Eagle Lake, but the business- men and citizens generally have shown that our efforts to give the town a first class newspaper are appreciated, and it is our in- tention, when this new machinery is installed, to give Eagle Lake a newspaper second to none of any town this size in Texas. Death of J. J. Pinchback.

(From the Colorado Citizen.)

Garwood and Colorado county in general mourn the loss of one of her best known, most highly respected and oldest citizens in the death of Mr. John Joseph Pinchback, which occurred sud- denly at his home in Garwood early last Friday morning.

The decedent was born near Chesterville, South Carolina, on March 25, 1848, and therefore had he lived until the 25th of next month would have been 87 years of age. For the past several years, although looking well and was able to be about at all times, he was suffering with heart trouble.

He was the son of William and Mary Pinchback and with his parents moved to Colorado county in 1858 and has lived in this county ever since. He was mar- ried to Miss Almonor F. How- land March 25, 1869, and to this union eight children were born, five of whom are living. They are W. H., J. W., T. J., and J. R. Pinchback and Mrs. J. L. Chap- man.

The subject of this obituary served with conspicuous gallan- try during the great war between the states, and about two years ago was presented with a cross of honor by the Shropshire Up- ton Chapter, U. D. C.

Mr. Pinchback with his family moved from their farm about six miles of Columbus to Garwood in 1901, where they have resided since. He was elected presi- dent of the Garwood State Bank when it was organized in 1910, which position he held with great credit up to the time of his death.

The funeral took place from the family residence in Garwood last Saturday morning at nine o'clock, the eulogy to the dead being said by Rev. Rufus Price, pastor of the Garwood Methodist church. Interment was had in the family burying grounds near Miller's Lake. The high esteem in which the deceased was held was evidenced by the large at- tendance at the funeral services at residence, and at the grave. By the death of Mr. Pinchback, a beloved wife had been made a widow and five children father- less. No citizen in Garwood was more popular with the people

than he; no citizen was more highly regarded than was he, and no death could be more deep- ly regretted than that of Mr. Pinchback, the man who did so much for his fellowmen.

No one admired more the sub- ject of this sketch than did this writer, and no one more regret- ted his death.

Mr. Pinchback was an honor- ary member of the Garwood Fire Department since its organiza- tion in 1911, and has been one of the most faithful and the life of the organization, being present at every meeting and was ever ready and willing to help finan- cially whenever the boys needed anything, and in his death they have lost a member whom it will be hard to replace.

Quite a number of the relatives and friends of the deceased from Columbus were in attendance at the funeral. Besides the heart- broken wife and children, that survive, there are nine grand- children and a large circle of other relatives and friends.

The active pall bearers were W. H. Shaw, Ed. R. Fink, Dr. W. J. Roberts, J. G. Cooper, G. M. Jackson, L. R. Bate and H. W. Huvar.

Death, at any time and in all its phases, is sad and unbearable but when its visitation is made in the sudden manner of Mr. Pinchback, who only the day be- fore was on the streets, the shock is terrible, not only to the be- lieved ones from whom he has departed, but also to his friends and business associates who knew him so well. The entire community feels the blow and felt the shock as keenly perhaps as any death was ever felt in the history of that section.

At the grave there were gath- ered the friends of the dead man and his family. The grave was literally covered with the most beautiful flowers, placed there by loving and tender hands. His death was sad but he died not friendless.

On behalf of the good people of Garwood and where he was known the Citizen extends to the saddened household the deepest and purest of sympathy and con- dolence, assuring them, that as keenly as they felt the awful blow, it is but little less in the hearts and minds of all those who knew and loved him so well.
