BONES OF PRE-HISTORIC ANIMAL FOUND ON RIVER

Mr. J. H. Wilkins was exhibiting a bone of some prehistoric animal here this week which attracted quite a good deal of attention. The bone is twenty-six inches long, and somewhat resembles a leg bone, but shows no joints, but looks more like a huge tusk of some kind. It is broken off at both ends. Mr.

Wilkins found the bone on the river bank back of the Bonus plantation; no doubt having been unearthed by the overflow of 1913. It was in one solid piece when he found it, but since it has been handled has been broken in two places. It is in a state of petrification, showing the bone formation in the center where it was broken. Every one that sees it is of the same opinion.
