By virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Eagle Lake, Colorado County, Texas, I hereby order an election to be held in and for the corporation of the said City of Eagle Lake, Texas, on Tuesday the 6th day of April, A. D. 1915 for the purpose of electing three aldermen for said City for the ensuing two years, to succeed C. H. Brosig, E. Middleton and A. R. McCreary, whose respective terms of office will have expired on that date, and to elect one city attorney for the ensuing two years, to succeed Emanuel Roos, whose term of office will have expired on that date.

Said election to be held at the Mayor's office in the city of Eagle Lake, Texas, which said election shall be held in conformity with the laws of the State of Texas governing general elections. I hereby nominate and appoint Wm. Falen as presiding officer of the said election and hereby give him full authority to select such judges and clerks as may be necessary to help hold said election.
