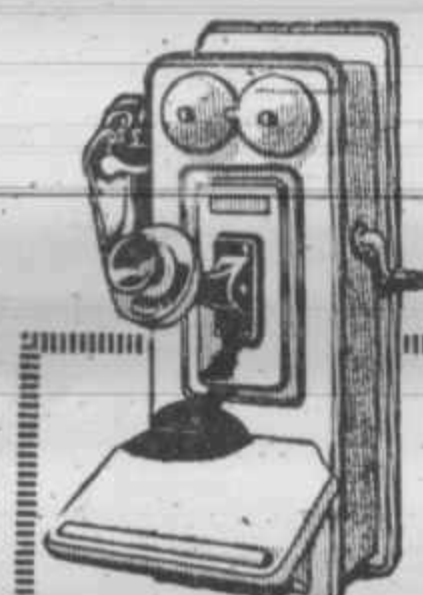

### ANOTHER SMALLPOX CASE HAS DEVELOPED IN TOWN

Another case of smallpox was developed in Eagle Lake this week, that of a colored woman, the wife of Aaron Ransom, who developed the disease Tuesday. She had been to Haskell where her daughter was recovering from smallpox and contracted the disease at that place. She lives across the Aransas Pass railroad on the Altair road, as the home is in an isolated place, City Health Officer J. K. Davidson has quarantined the place. The only person with the woman is her daughter, who has already had the smallpox, and the city authorities look for no other cases from exposure to this one. While the tents are still remaining out at the pest camp, there are no cases of smallpox in town, with the exception of this one.

## HELEN KELLER GIVES MESSAGE OF HAPPINESS

Helen Keller, blind and deaf from infancy and dumb for years, addressed an audience of 2,000 at Dallas last week. The following excerpt from the Dallas News is taken from a report of her address, and contains thoughts which should impress everyone in this day of strife and restlessness. The News says:

Happiness was her theme. Happiness for one of God's creatures who, since she was nineteen months old, has been deprived of her two most important senses, and during most of that time of three of her five senses. She gave it not, but there was borne into the understanding of her audience a new idea of achievement. Helpless at 7 she knew not the name of a thing. She had a doll, but she did not know what to call it. She ate, but she did not know why, except that she was hungry. She had father and mother and loved ones, but she did not know who they were or why.

Now she is an educated woman, better educated, perhaps, than any of the persons who heard her last night, although they are possessed of every faculty. She has finished with high honors at Radcliffe College. She speaks French and German as well as English. She reads, reads, reads and writes, writes, writes. But the world well knows what Helen Keller has accomplished and under what difficulties. That under such handicaps she has learned to speak with her tongue is one of the marvels of all time. It took her twenty years to learn to speak well enough to ask the public to hear her. She learned the method of pronunciation by putting her fingers to her teacher's mouth. Her thumb was placed on the throat at the point of the larynx, her second finger on the lips and her middle finger on the nose. So, when Helen Keller came to speak to Dallas people, they, knowing these difficulties, sat with bated breath and bowed heads and yearning ears while she gave them her message of happiness. Thus she spoke: "I am glad I came here tonight."

to tell you men and women of happiness and that I am happy. I cannot see your faces nor hear your voices, but I can feel your love all about me, and it helps me. I like to go among men and women and tell them I am happy and that they can be happy, too.

"I was blind, now I see. I was dumb, now I speak. What wrought this miracle in me? It was the love of another. Without my teacher I should be nothing. We live for each other. The life of others is the only life worth living. "Some people have told me I am happy because I live in a beautiful dream. Do not think I am deceived about the actions of men. I know their selfishness and greed. I see them going after things that are not worth going after. But these evils do not shake my faith. "Good is stronger than evil. "Light is stronger than darkness. "I am not afraid of the dark because there is light in my soul. "I do not expect always to be pleased, but I do expect always to be happy. "The world is full of miracles. Hunt for them and you will find them. "Open the door of your soul. "Look at the beautiful poetry. Look at the stars and be glad. Make something, do something, say something to gladden another and happiness will come to you. "If you find happiness you will please, express it. The purpose of the world is happiness, the purpose of life is to give happiness.

"It is not enough to fill your own life with happiness. Fill others' lives first. I see men who are successful, but they are not happy. I see those who are brilliant, who have achieved splendid things, yet they are not happy. "Love is happiness; the love that is the brotherhood of man. The world will be saved by the love that is in it, as I was saved by the love of another. "Governments founded on force shall not prevail. The world is at war. Millions are being killed, but in spite of all this, happiness has escaped darkness. "There is no darkness so deep but that the sunlight of faith can find its way there."

And so one might prolong the list of divers insect pests, which tackle man and make him twist, and soak him when he rests. But all the flying, crawling crew which prod our tender hide might be endured and seem but few, could chiggers be denied. Too small to swat, too smart to catch, they make our anger rise; it seems they ought to make a match with someone of their size.
