

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## HELEN KELLER GIVES MESSAGE OF HAPPINESS

Helen Keller, blind and deaf from infancy and dumb for years, addressed an audience of 2,000 at Dallas last week. The following excerpt from the Dallas News is taken from a report of her address, and contains thoughts which should impress everyone in this day of strife and restlessness. The News says:

Happiness was her theme. Happiness for one of God's creatures who, since she was nineteen months old, has been deprived of her two most important senses and during most of that time of three of her five senses.

She gave it not, but there was borne into the understanding of her audience a new idea of achievement.

Happless at 7 she knew not the name of a thing. She had a doll, but she did not know what to call it. She ate, but she did not know why, except that she was hungry. She had father and mother and loved ones, but she did not know who they were or why.

Now she is an educated woman, better educated, perhaps, than any of the persons who heard her last night, although they are possessed of every faculty. She has finished with high honors at Radcliffe College. She speaks French and German as well as English. She reads, reads, reads and writes, writes, writes.

But the world well knows what Helen Keller has accomplished and under what difficulties. That under such handicaps she has learned to speak with her tongue is one of the marvels of all time.

It took her twenty years to learn to speak well enough to ask the public to bear her. She learned the method of pronunciation by putting her fingers to her teacher's mouth. Her thumb was placed on the throat at the point of the larynx, her second finger on the lips and her middle finger on the nose.

So, when Helen Keller came to speak to Dallas people, they, knowing these difficulties, sat with bated breath and bowed heads and yearning ears while she gave them her message of happiness.

Thus she spoke: "I am glad I came here tonight.
