Long-Hunted Negro is Held.

El Campo, Texas, March 12.—Constable Abe Beakes and ex-Deputy Sheriff A. S. Reitz arrested George Armstrong, a negro, at Danavang last night. Armstrong is charged with the murder of Herman Schoenberg at Louise, Texas, in December, 1913. He has been at large since the murder with the exception of the time he was arrested at Bishop when he jumped from the moving train near Bay City on the way to the Wharton jail. The capture was through the arrest of craphooters last week when one of the negroes told Constable Beakes that Armstrong was the negro that escaped from the officers at that time. Armstrong has been at Danavang since the day after his jump from the train.

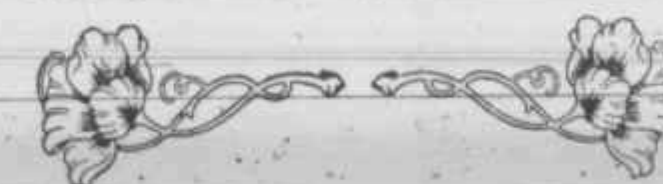
