## IN MEMORIAM

God's finger touched my brother, Lewis M. Wirtz, and he slept and woke to life eternal, Thursday morning, February 25th, 1915, when he passed from those who loved him here. He was a true, noble Christian, ever loyal to his church and Sunday School, always remembering the children and the poor with gifts of love, kind words and smiles. Truly, these words express the life he lived:

"My Jesus, as Thou wilt  
Oh, may Thy will be done  
Into Thy hands of love  
I would all mine resign.  
Through sorrow or through joy,  
Conduct me as Thou own."

No man ever possessed a higher sense of honor. He was an upright moral citizen, a loyal faithful friend, a kind, gentle brother and a devoted, loving father. None ever loved or was more devoted to a brother than was Lewis.

Few indeed are those who in passing shall leave behind as clean and as enviable a record. He possessed a true Christian character, with supreme faith in God, which never wavered in all his trials and afflictions, though they were many, for, like Job of old, he was severely tested. It is not always easy, sometimes it appears not even possible, to say "Thy will be done," yet we know that "God is Love," and that these afflictions, which seem to us grievous, endure but for a season, and that joy cometh in the morning. To me it seems that my brother's death was untimely, for he was cut down in the prime of a Christian's life, capable and useful, just the kind of a man that the Christian world needs to combat sin.

"If we could push aside the gates of death and stand within the realm of life, we could interpret all this doubt and strife. And for each mystery could find a key."

This came into my brother's life, for during his last illness he often expressed as full resignation to the Divine will as it is possible for a soul to manifest, saying, "I have left it all with the Lord; whatever He does is right."

"Do we comfort when another star  
Shines out from the glorious sky?  
Do we weep when the voice of war  
And the roar of the conflict dies?  
Why then should our tears roll down,  
And our hearts be so sorely torn,  
For another gem in the Savior's crown  
And another soul in Heaven?"
