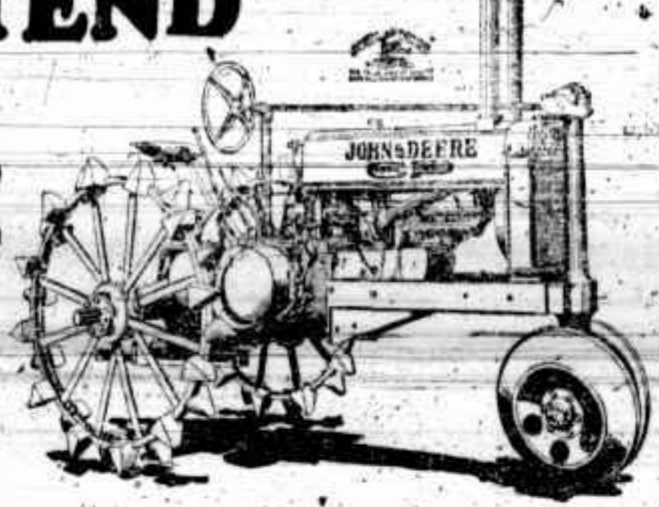
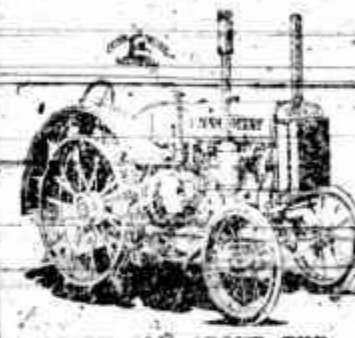

Rose Cuttings Grown Easily. (By Mrs. W. A. Stock) All rose cuttings should be decayed before putting out, by cutting under skin. One eye is left to bud and grow, said Mrs. B. H. Schramm at an all-day meeting of the Green Home Demonstration Club held at the home of Mrs. Raymond Schramm in Wharton County. Rose cuttings should be put out in moist, coarse, warm sand. A box 12 1/2 inches long, 10 inches wide and 10 inches deep is sufficient to hold 300 cuttings. None but Texas Wax should be used as they are certain to grow. No danger of root rot and will resist crown. Rose diseases can be avoided by using 9 parts of sulphur and 1 part of arsenate as a spray every 10 days.
