BOULDER DAM

COLLOSSAL CONCRETE BARRIER OF THE COLORADO

The closing of one of the 50-foot barrier, pedestrians on the highway tunnels by which the Colorado River has been diverted around the site of Boulder Dam for the past two years recently marked one of the final phases of the great irrigation, flood-control, and power project in Black Canyon. Slowly the water is now creating a lake above the dam—two years ahead of the time promised by the builders.

"Boulders Dam is not the longest dam ever built, but in nearly all other respects it has not even a close competitor," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic Society. "Man has never constructed a higher water barrier. The impounded water in the lake will form the largest artificial reservoir in existence. The largest generators ever built will occupy the world's largest power house and produce more than twice the electric power that is produced by the Dneprostoy power house on the Dnieper, the greatest power producer."

"When workmen finished the excavations for the dam's foundations, a ten-story building could have been placed in the cavity and the roof of the building would not have shown above the old Colorado River bed. When the last batch of concrete for the dam and power plant is poured in June of this year, these units will contain nearly enough material to build a standard, 16-foot concrete highway from Miami, Florida, to Seattle, Washington."

Chemical heat given off by the drying cement is dissipated by cold water pumped through 300 miles of one-inch pipe imbedded in the concrete. The dam is 105 feet thick at the base than the height of the Washington Monument. If the famous obelisk were placed beside the

barrier, pedestrians on the highway which will occupy the dam's crest, would look down on its aluminum cap, about 30 feet below.

"It will take more than two years to fill the lake. When the water becomes 585 feet deep at the dam, the lake will be 115 miles long. Most of the lake will be within the canyon, spreading in some places as much as eight miles. About 20 miles above the dam, the Virgin River Valley breaks the Nevada side of the canyon. A portion of this valley will be inundated and the lake will be about 30 miles wide. Filled to its capacity, the vast reservoir will contain 80,000 gallons of water for every person in the United States. Only a small proportion of land inundated by the lake was privately owned."

"The power house below the dam is a building shaped like a squared letter U. It lies in Nevada and half in Arizona. The building is a mile and a half long from the end of one leg to the end of the other, and is as high as a twenty-story office building. Light and power for cities and industries many miles distant will be produced by fifteen large and two small generators."

"Although the Boulder Dam project is for flood control and irrigation as well as for power production, contracts for the power and domestic water supply already signed, will, in a fifty-year period, pay the cost of the dam, and all appurtenances, their maintenance and operation; and at the end of the period it is estimated that there will be a surplus of \$168,000,000."

"The All-American Canal, a part of the project, will be the third largest canal in the United States—232 feet wide and 20 feet deep. The main canal which branches off from the Colorado River above Yuma and extends in-

to the Coachella Valley will be 130 miles long. A branch to Imperial Valley will be 80 miles long. Irrigable land equal to nearly half the area of New Jersey can be reached by the waters of Boulder Lake."

"As Boulder Dam progresses, another group of engineers is building an aqueduct that will remake the geography of the Southwest. It will carry virtually an enclosed river—a billion gallons of water a day—through mountains and across deserts of southern California, from the Colorado River to Los Angeles and neighboring cities on the Pacific coast. This huge aqueduct when completed will traverse 46 tunnels, aggregating 85 miles; and will make use of 9 storage and regulating reservoirs. Fifty-six miles of this man-made river will be buried concrete conduit while 75 miles will be concrete lined canal."

"Before Boulder Dam was conceived, the neighborhood of the dam site was described by a leading government official as a hideous desert. Las Vegas, 25 miles west of the canyon, was the nearest town. When government men and contractors planned to begin construction on the dam in 1931, they saw the need of a city nearer the site than Las Vegas. Almost overnight Boulder City, six miles from the dam site, sprang into being. Houses and barracks rose and macadam roads were laid down. Then came theaters, schools, hotels, and shops. The town soon had 3,000 inhabitants, thus becoming Nevada's third largest community."

Officials Hope to Tell the President
Birthday Ball Result Within Month

NEW YORK (Special)—Within the next month or six weeks officials of the Birthday Ball for the President hope to tell President Roosevelt and the 4,000,000 Americans who attended 7,000 birthday parties in more than 4,000 cities and towns how much their 1935 contributions have aided the war against infantile paralysis.

The thrill, the drama and the spectacle of simultaneously staging the world's greatest social event under 7,000 roofs is history. To the heads of organized labor, fraternal, social, civic and industrial groups which cooperated in the work of raising funds to aid America's 200,000 sufferers from infantile paralysis, the national committee has sent its thanks. But there remains to face Col. Henry L. Doherty, national chairman, and others who have contributed their time and talent; one of the most staggering accounting jobs in modern business annals. Although a full staff of certified public accountants is working overtime under Keith Morgan, national treasurer, to correlate reports as fast as they come in from the 4,000 local treasurers, no final announcement can be made within a month to six weeks, Col. Doherty said.

Unofficial reports already received by Col. Carl Byoir, who handled the enormous task of organizing the country to make the Birthday Ball possible, show that record-breaking events were held in New York, Chicago, Washington, Denver, Kansas City, Miami, Boston, Atlanta, Columbus and Cleveland, as well as in scores of other population centers and thousands of smaller communities.

Involved in the final accounting this year is the fact that 70 cents of every dollar raised by the birthday parties is to be retained by the communities for local rehabilitation, the other 30 per cent to go to the President's Birthday Ball Commission for Infantile Paralysis Research.
