of Eagle Lake, Texas, which has
been slaughtered by the said Colly
and Thomas at their slaughtering
plant near the City of Eagle Lake,
in Colorado County, Texas, unless
such slaughtering plant or plants
have been approved by the City
Health Officer, of the City of Eagle
Lake, Texas, and said slaughtering
plant or plants must not be so ap-
proved unless the same comply with
the requirements set out in the suc-
ceeding sections of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. Buildings or other
slaughtering plant shall be sub-
stantially constructed of material easily
adapted to first class cleanliness.
Such plant must provide for the
following departments:

STOCK PEN'S KILL ROOMS.
CHILL ROOMS, COLD STORAGE.
And approved method of handling
offal. Such slaughtering plant
shall not be approved if it is situ-
ated at a greater distance than
three (3) miles from the City Limits
of the said City of Eagle Lake,
Texas.

SECTION 3. The said slaughtering
plant in which animals are to be
slaughtered by the said Colly
and Thomas and to be sold for food
in the City of Eagle Lake, Texas,
or elsewhere, shall be operated in
conformance with the following pro-
visions:

(a) No animal intended for
slaughter shall remain on the
premises of adjacent thereto, long-
er than it is necessary for the in-
spection on foot and immediate slaugh-
ter thereof.

(b) All animals intended to be
slaughtered shall be inspected while
alive and on foot by the City In-
spector in person specially con-
structed for that purpose, which in-
spection shall be made at all times
and at all places where the animals
are kept, and no animal shall be
slaughtered that has not first been
inspected by the City Inspector and
declared to be healthy and suitable
for human consumption. Every animal
slaughtered shall be inspected
during the process of slaughtering
who shall use such method of in-
spection as is now in use by the
Bureau of Animal Industry.

(c) Every carcass of every animal
slaughtered or intended for
food or food products shall be in-
spected by the City Inspector, and
passed marked or stamped with a
stamp or mark to be provided for
that purpose and shall keep a
record of said inspection with the
name of the owner or owners, kind
of cattle and condition, shall be
made by said City Inspector, which
record of such inspection shall be
entered on the Inspector's daily
report and shall be filed with the
Secretary of the City of Eagle Lake,
Texas, at the end of each month.

(d) The first word and refuse
from slaughtered animals or pro-
ducts thereof shall be condemned upon
inspection by the City Inspector
shall immediately be placed in a
reduction plant or otherwise dis-
posed of under the direction of the
Inspector.

(e) All trucks, traps, knives and
other receptacles, all boxes, plat-
forms, tracks, tables, etc., and all
saws, cleavers and other tools and
implements, machinery and articles
used in moving, handling, cutting,
or chopping of other process shall
be kept clean and free from con-
tamination at all times.

handling live cattle and in butchering
cattle, hogs, sheep, etc., and
who is capable of determining good
healthy, sound meat as well as to
determine from his said inspection
whether such meat is tainted and
unfit for food for human consump-
tion. The first word and refuse from
slaughtered animals or products thereof
shall be condemned upon inspection by
the City Inspector shall immediately be
placed in a reduction plant or otherwise
disposed of under the direction of the
Inspector.

(f) It shall be unlawful for any
person or persons to transport or
cause to be transported in any ve-
hicle in or upon any street or pub-
lic place, any animal that has been
slaughtered or the carcass of such
animal, or any part thereof, unless
such animal or carcass is properly
wrapped in paper, tightly
covered with cloth or other material
which is provided with a tight
cover which shall be kept closed at
all times during such transportation
so as not to expose the meat
products to dust, dirt, filth or other
detrimental substances.

(g) It shall be the duty of the
City Health Officer of the Health
Department of the City of Eagle
Lake, Texas, to make such in-
spection of the said Colly and
Thomas from time to time
where said animals are slaughtered
and to see whether such places are
clean and sanitary and conformed
in compliance with the require-
ments of this ordinance.

(h) The City Council of the said
City of Eagle Lake, Texas, shall
appoint an Inspector who shall per-
form all the duties provided in this
ordinance and said Inspector
shall be a person who has had not
less than five years experience in
any inspection.

SECTION 5. The violation of
this ordinance shall be deemed to be
a misdemeanor and any person vi-
olating the same shall upon con-
viction be fined in any sum not ex-
ceeding \$100.00.

SECTION 6. All ordinances and
parts of ordinances in conflict herewith
are hereby expressly repealed.

In the event that any part or
parts of this ordinance shall be held
by any Court of competent jurisdic-
tion to be invalid, such invalidity shall
not affect the other parts or portions
thereof.

The fact that there is now no
adequate ordinance regulating the
subject matter heretofore, creates a
public necessity and an emergency
requiring the suspension of the rule
that ordinances be read at three
separate meetings of the City Coun-
cil and the foregoing ordinance shall
have been read in full at this
meeting, it was moved by Alderman
G. W. Keith and seconded by Al-
derman J. M. Brewer that the rule
regarding ordinances be read at
three separate meetings of the City
Council before final passage; be and
