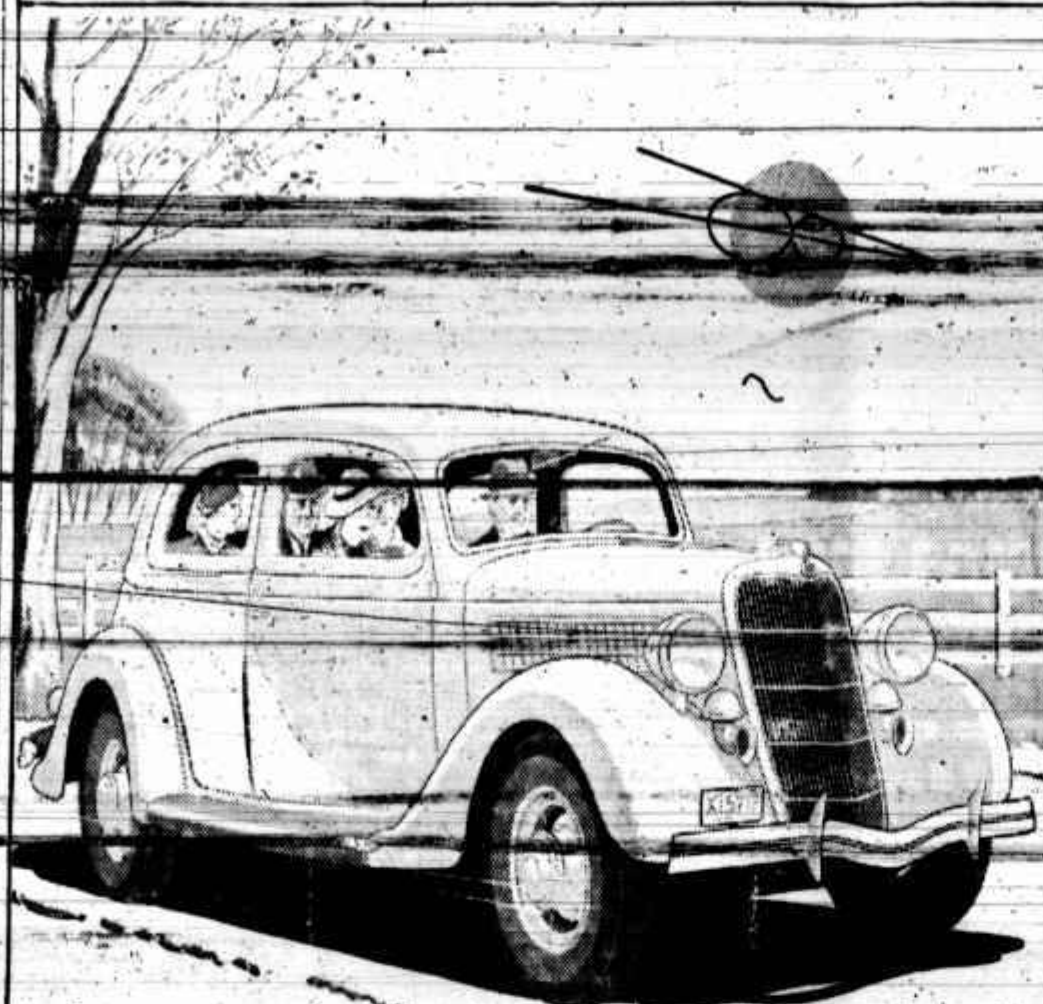

COTTON RESEARCH

A belated attempt to aid waning Texas cotton exports by appropriating the paltry sum of \$55,000, to set up fiber testing laboratories at Texas A. & M. College and Clemson College, South Carolina, is a concession that all is not right with American cotton. Whatever Congress does about it, the subject needed serious attention long ago. To permit foreign countries to take away our cotton markets and even go so far as to try to prove to buyers that their staple is superior to that of this country, betrays a disconcerting misconception of the entire problem on the part of so-called agricultural leaders. Foreign spinners have established new connections with cotton firms in Brazil, India, Egypt and Argentina, and

see no reason for switching from as good or better staple bought at a lower price, so that it will take more than fiber laboratories and investigations to restore lost markets. The subject must be approached from such angles as tariff revision downward, reciprocal trade agreements or barrier of goods.

A sum of \$200,000 to be assigned to the Bureau of Plant Industry to carry on its work in seed and cultural tests related to soils and other environmental factors is right and

proper, for this institution has never had sufficient funds to make the basic studies of cotton culture which Texas and the South long have needed. It is gratifying that some of the higher-ups in official Washington are beginning to do a little thinking about what has happened to Texas cotton exports, which at latest accounts show a decline of just 50 per cent below last season's figures (August to February). After the horse has been shod, it is anybody's job to close the barn door.

Cotton is a billion-dollar enterprise and it long ago should have had a million-dollar research laboratory in which every problem of its ultimate use would have been in process of solution. It is not too late now.—Dallas News.

SPECIAL SUMMER RATES TO POINTS IN CALIFORNIA

This summer the Southern Pacific will offer to the public the greatest railroad bargain in history to California, according to an announcement by J. T. Monroe, passenger traffic manager.

From Eagle Lake the round trip fare to Los Angeles or San Diego will apply from all other Texas and Louisiana points. The special tickets will be on sale six days only, June 15-16, July 20-21 and August 17-18.

Upon payment of the usual Pullman charges, standard sleeping car accommodations may be obtained and these persons wishing to save more money may ride the tourist sleeping cars, as charges are approximately 50 per cent less than in standard Pullmans. Coach and chair car accommodations will also be obtainable.

This year, however, the bargain is far more attractive, as Pullman charges are one-third less than two years ago, and the "Sunset Limited," king of the rails west to California, will be completely air-conditioned this summer. Too dining car meals may be had at low cost.

Mr. Monroe also stated that children may go at half fare, stopovers will be permitted at all points, and the return limit will be twenty-one days. And San Diego will be the world's host for 167 days, May 29 to November 11, during the California Pacific International Exposition, when countless exhibits of industry and commerce will depict man's progress not only to show what has been done, but also what has been done.
