EMERGENCY CROP LOANS
AVAILABLE HERE NOW
Field Supervisor L. S. R. Clark of the
Emergency-Crop Loan Office at Dallas,
states that applications for emergency
crop loans and advances are now being
received by the Colorado County loan
committee, with offices located in the
Eagle Lake Grain Company store at
Eagle Lake and at the Frank Am-
old Co. in Garwood.
In accordance with the Act of
Congress authorizing the loans, and
regulations issued by Governor M. I.
Meyers of the Farm Credit Adminis-
tration, loans will be made only to
farmers who are unable to obtain
credit on the ordinary credit to pur-
chase such items. Loans will not be
made to applicants who can obtain
credit in the amount needed from any
other source, including the pro-
duction credit association.
Any farmer who has the necessary
security should apply to the pro-
duction credit association first. If the
association is unable to make him a
loan in the amount needed, the farmer
will receive a statement to that
effect and will be considered
eligible to apply for a loan from the
emergency fund.
The regulations provide that the
maximum loan to one farmer this year
is \$500 and the minimum \$10, but
no loan may be made in an amount
greater than is needed to cover the
cost of producing seed, fertilizers,
supplies, feed, etc. Loans will be
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allowing, for purchasing seed, and
for the purchase of livestock or machinery
or for the payment of debts or taxes.
Loans will be made to applicants who
are co-operating with the pro-
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Agricultural Adjustment Adminis-
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In the past, the security for an
emergency crop loan has been the
land of the farmer, but now it will
consist of a first lien on the crop
financed or on the livestock to be
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first lien by getting the landowner to
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tenant's loan.
