THE ARCHIVES OF BEXAR

When Business of the Texas Government, from 1727 to 1835, was Centered in San Antonio.

(Note: The following is one of a series of weekly articles taken from the Archives of the University of Texas. This collection, considered the greatest single historical treasure on the North American continent, has been catalogued and is now being translated by the University of Texas. It consists of 400,000 pages of original Spanish handwritten documents comprising the official archives of the Mexican government for the Department of Bexar, which covered almost the whole of what is now the State of Texas, for the period from 1727, soon after Texas became a separate province of Mexico, to 1835, the Battle of San Jacinto. This series of articles will consist principally of quotations from the documents, many of which have heretofore been unpublished, and will reveal for the first time what actually transpired during the century in which Texas was transformed from a wilderness, inhabited only by savage Indian tribes, to an independent Mexican republic.)

During the Spanish regime in Texas, the history of the country was practically decided by the character, distribution and interference of the native Indian tribes. As it was not enough to pacify the arm of the government in far-away Mexico City, the presence of French traders and land-hungry Anglo-Americans on the Louisiana border and the activities of adventurous agents and highly excited Creoles in the very heart of the section still further complicated an extremely dangerous situation.

To the victory, nearly a thousand miles away, and to the Commandant General, far across the Rio Grande, the conflicting reports submitted by the military commander in Bexar seemed to demand peace, the next seemed to require war. What to do in any given crisis was the ever recurring question. Neither peace nor war seemed to solve the problem, for one party of Indians would "play good" and beg the government to protect them against "a bad bunch"—any action, or no action, would inevitably bring trouble.

Then it was that a new compromise measure was tried—a system that enabled the French to hold the good-will of the savages and to maneuver themselves into a position of "arbiters" between the Spaniards and their wards, the Redmen, who like spotted children were always plotting, always being for more.

The Spaniards, like indulgent fathers, were willing to go to the bottom of their pockets books. But when the bottom was reached, only trouble could ensue. Things went round in a vicious circle. What was to be only time could tell.

What it must have cost the Spaniards to meet these demands of the Redmen for "gifts" can be roughly estimated from one actual report. It included the following distribution of articles to 1,235 friendly Indians: Three rifles, 1,343 knives, 269 small knives, 506 scissors, 89 axes, 48 hoes, 478 combs, 12 vases of wire, 4,182 pounds of glass beads, 46 pounds of vermilion, 261 mirrors, 3 axes, 589 yards of ribbon, 16 copper pots, 10 dimes, 35 cents, 35 beads, 33 trousers, 3,768 hawkeles, 14 plain shirts, 30 shirts with ruffles, 121 shirts with stiff bosoms, 611 vases of wooden cloth, 49 hats, 24 iron pots, 20 goggets or decorations for the head, 24 flags, 455 canmoss, 265 leaf rolls of tobacco, 612 steel links, 43 small bells, and 35 pair of buckles. These gifts, itemized by the month, were distributed principally to the Comanches, Tawacas, Lipans, and Caramachas—with occasional gifts being made to the Huichitas, Yanchahuas, Cacos, Atascapas and the Tejas tribes. It was noteworthy that the Comanches received presents every month except one, with the Lipans receiving a dose each week.

The trickery of the Indians can be seen from a communication from the governor of Texas, Domingo Cabello to Jacinto or Ugarite Loyaola, the advocate of war: "On the 26th of last month six Indians of the Tawaca tribe came to this Presidio. They were anxious to be the first to bring news of the success of the 200 Tawacas, (Tawacas) against the Comanches who had a battle with the Lipans on the 20th of last month about which I have already informed your Lordship in my letter number 217."

"These six Indians have added little to the facts I knew already and their object was solely to get ahead of the others, and tell about the fight. This was an excuse to get in abundance during the days they spent here. I have already told them to go back to their tribe, for they do not deserve a reward—figure of their nor any of the Comanches."

These six Indians had given all of them I mention, this so your Lordship will keep it in mind when I send the statement of the expenses.

"Miguel Perez, a Ynhan Indian, the one I know more about than any of the others, when he was eight years old he was captured by the Lipans, who went along as auxiliaries in the expedition of 1759 against the Tawacas led by Colonel Diego Ortiz Parrilla, captain of the Presidio of San Antonio. The only rancheria of the Lipans was located on the Rio del Puerro that runs between the old Presidio of San Antonio and the village of the Tawacas. They attacked this village, captured some Indians and killed others, while the rest fled, taking refuge with the Tawacas (Yanchahuas). The said Miguel Perez was among the Lipans who was brought to this Presidio where, Balazsar Perez, Alferez in command of the old men, who is a Christian, raised him and bestowed his name upon him. He has been very faithful to his master and helps him in everything. Notwithstanding being married to an Indian woman from one of the ranches, he conducts himself very well."

"The father and the oldest brother of the said Miguel Perez were among those who suffered the fate mentioned above. They have lived among the Tawacas with a good reputation so much so, that after the death of El Mocho, they made the alferez Miguel Perez's brother chief. Before this he came here very often with his father, to visit his brother, who could not will himself to live among the Indians, and never went to pay back their visit. Last February, hearing the plan of his father and his brother, he asked my permission to go and visit them. I gladly gave it, so that he would take a message to his brother, telling him how much I was pleased with him for the great friendship and treaty he had formed with the Lipans. I mentioned that if that was the reason why he had left El Mocho, killed, he himself might meet with the same fate. Because of all this I would not remember either him or his people."

"While they were wondering what to do, 200 Indians of the Tawacas, Iznais and Flechazos arrived with the same fate. Because of all this I would not remember either him or his people."

"The chief of the Tawacas, the son of Sicut Oayon, prepared a very good plan of attack. He proposed to attack the enemy through the Caballada which was on the other side of the river, and wanted to attack the Lipans from that side. They did so and succeeded in capturing the Caballada which consisted of 600 head of horses. However, the attack was not successful because, as soon as the Lipans heard of the approach of the enemy, they took refuge in the woods and were not killed, which would have happened if the plan of the chief of the Tawacas had been followed."

"The Indians were satisfied with the booty of the Caballada and everything they found on the ranch. They returned to the village of the Tawacas where they distributed the booty and the captives. Twelve of the Tawacas returned to their own village, and the Tawacas remained in their village dancing the mitote, according to their custom. The others have been doing the same thing according to a report of the Tawacas."

"When the Tawacas, Yznais and Flechazos took leave, they promised to unite again and continue their war against the Lipans. They promised that they would keep each other informed of the time in which they would meet again."

"Among the Tawacas was Miguel Perez. Since he was an eye witness to the battle, he gave me a report of it."
