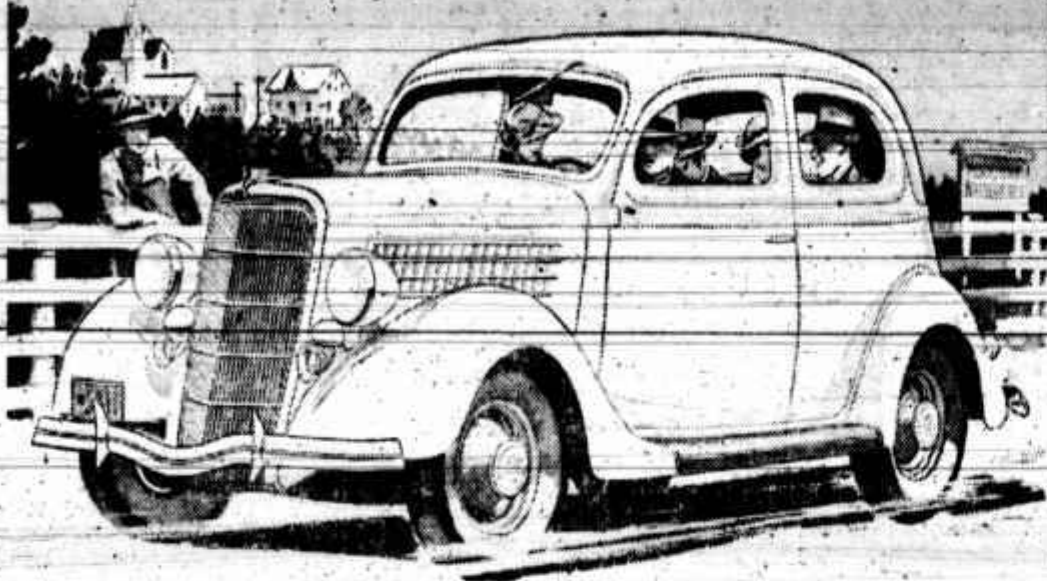

DIES TELLS LEGISLATURE WHERE LAWS ARE LEADING

Congressman Martin Dies of Texas told a joint session of the Texas legislature Tuesday that the Bankhead Act must be abandoned to prevent a destruction of the foreign markets for the South's cotton.

Dies said exports of American cotton for the eight months ended March 31 were 3,537,000 bales, compared with 6,098,000 bales for the same period in 1934. He said that five and one-half times as much spinning machinery was exported last year as during the previous year.

As a substitute for the compulsory acreage reduction policy, Dies suggested that the cotton farmer be given a subsidy on that portion of his crop consumed domestically and be permitted to sell as many additional bales on the world market as he desired. The congressman said the government should give the farmer at least ten cents a pound above the world market price for that portion of his crop consumed in this country.
