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LOWLY TOAD WORTH ITS WEIGHT IN GOLD

The common, lowly, warty toad is worth its weight in gold to any farmer, gardener, or florist, says Leonard Haseman, chairman of the Department of Entomology of the Missouri College of Agriculture.

Some growers even stock their gardens with toads.

There are few animals so well adapted or so efficient in destroying the crawling, hopping, and lowing insect pests as is the toad.

No insect pest is too small or too large for the toad to tackle, and it has been reported that large toads have been seen to eat small mice.

Those who are so ready to kill the toad or who incorrectly look upon it as the producer of warts only know how many harmful insects toads destroy each summer.

They would be wiser to protect this unassuming bug-trap.

No cat after a mouse was ever more effective than the toad in stalking its prey.

Approaching the insect prey the toad suddenly springs into being within about two inches of it.

With the toad's body slightly elevated and head down, the bug disappears so suddenly it cannot be followed with the eye.

The toad's sticky tongue, which is loose on the back end, is suddenly thrust forward, strikes its prey, and the rubber band is so quickly drawn back into the mouth that it cannot be seen.
