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DUNCAN RANCH NEGRO RODEO SUNDAY WEEK

Annual Wild West Show, With All Performers Negro Cow Hands, Is Attended Each Year By Many White People.

The annual Duncan Ranch June-teenth rodeo will be held in the rodeo arena on the Duncan ranch, four miles south of Eagle Lake, Sunday, June 16th. The program will begin at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

The annual all-colored rodeo is an affair eagerly looked forward to by the negro community. The performers are all negro cow hands, hands in regular employment on ranches of this section of Texas. It is a rodeo show in which real cow hands do their stuff.

With the added antics, that peculiar to the negro cow hand, the show is always interesting and entertaining. A special side is always retained for white people, for there are always more white spectators in attendance than negroes.

Real bucking horses, Brahmas, bulls and fast calves will be featured in the program, and negro cow hands will attempt to ride the famous Duncan ranch bucking horses, including "Lucky Strike," "Judge Coleman," "Wagon Wheel," "Pancho Villa," "Trouble" and "Bounce," horses that are well known to all rodeo fans of this section of the state.

The admission price for the all-colored rodeo performance will be 25 cents.

Mr. I. V. Duncan, owner and manager of the Duncan D-Cross Ranch, in answer to the Headlight's question stated that no definite date has been set for the annual Duncan ranch spring rodeo. This event is usually held on Saturday and Sunday during the first weeks of June each year. Owing to the continued rains, no effort has been made for a date for the rodeo. Whether the rodeo will be held at all this spring, Mr. Duncan has not decided. If the rainy weather continues, in all probability this event will not be held before fall. However, should the weather ever settle down to weather that gives promise of the usual dry, summer weather, it is likely that the rodeo will be held some time in July. Though, under present weather conditions, no arrangement whatever is being undertaken for the first spring rodeo. It all depends on future weather conditions, Mr. Duncan said.

ACCEPTANCE OF ACREAGE SENT TO COTTONMEN

Notice Of Acceptance Of 1935 Cotton Contracts Are Being Mailed To Farmers Of Colorado County This Week.

This week the Colorado County cotton producers have been mailed their notice of acceptance of their 1935 cotton contracts.

Mr. Young, county agent, also calls the attention of those receiving the notices of acceptance that the column marked "Farm Allotment" does not apply to this exemption certificates. The "Farm Allotment" column on the notice of acceptance slip is that portion expressed in pounds of lint cotton by which parity payments will be made.

Mr. Young further states that the notices of acceptance being received now are those where there are no adjustments either upward or downward on the contracts and where there are no errors in the contract and no change of legal status on the contract.

No notices of acceptance on any contracts have been received that were adjusted up or down or where there has been a change of legal status on the farm or where an application has been made for a contract for the first time in 1935.

It is very important, Mr. Young says, that producers who are holding tax exemption certificates that were issued or transferred to them in 1934 and who expect to use these certificates in 1935, bring or mail them to the county agent's office to be transferred to 1935 certificate forms. In no case can a producer use 1934 certificates in 1935 unless these certificates are transferred. Any producer holding 1934 certificates must have these certificates in for transfer no later than June 20th.

All farmers who are planting cotton on their farms this year must come to the county agent's office to make application for the free tax exemption certificates not later than June 10th.

Mr. Young asks that you be prepared to give the number of bales of cotton you raised in 1933 and 1934, what they weighed, and the number of acres you had in cotton in 1933 and 1934.
