

Peace in the World

THE question of peace has never more insistently occupied men's attention than it does today. And yet, in spite of all the thought that is being given to this question, peace seems still far off.

We have advanced to the point of looking for a world peace—a comprehensive peace—but mankind generally does not understand the idea of peace in its own sense. Apart from the multiplicity of problems to be resolved in order to bring about a world peace, there are the problems of the individual, of the nation, of the world.

Peace is not primarily the absence of sickness, the elimination of strife in the home or society, nor the absence of war among the nations. The absence of these things is assured as peace is gained, but it is not peace in itself, for peace is the realization of the highest good within the human mind, the highest good as between the highest good available and something lower than the best.

Even when two or more individuals seem to be engaged in strife the problem is reducible to the conflict between good and evil within the consciousness of those concerned. If good predominates in one's consciousness the strife will in that measure diminish; for while hate cannot cure hate, righteousness eliminates selfishness, the substitution of love for hate, and selfishness for selfishness.
