PRESCRIBE FOR SELF
TO ENJOY PROSPERITY

At the low point in a business depression, a man whose personal affairs were in bad order wrote: "The big business leaders have made a horrible mess of things."

It did not occur to the man to accuse himself and acclaim: "I have made a horrible mess of things."

He had six years of uninterrupted prosperity in which to put his house in order. He might have utilized the cream from those fat years. He could have paid off the mortgage on his house, retired his business obligations and accumulated a surplus to tide him over hard times. If he had done these things, and if several million others had been as frugal, the crisis that later distressed everyone might not have occurred.

Too many of us are disposed to blame "the system" when we are in difficulties. The system under which we operate is based on freedom of individual enterprise. Each of us is allowed a loose rein in the management of our affairs. We may save money or spend it. We may work or loaf. We may insure our lives or take a chance on leaving our families destitute. The government and public exercise only moderate control.

When everyone is happy and well-off we have hurrahs and hosannas for the genius of our business leaders. Some of these leaders come to believe that they are really Napoleons of finance and industry. They become vulgar. The wise man, however, discounts such nonsense because he realizes that all men are human and that excessive ambition leads to Waterloo.

Instead of relying on the wisdom of others, he puts his faith in his own common sense. If his earnings double and triple in good times, he takes the surplus and puts it where he knows it is safe. While others are borrowing money at the peak of prosperity, he is rapidly getting himself out of debt.

How many have the courage and foresight and independent judgment to follow this obvious procedure? History reveals such common sense is rare. Too many men pay in hard times the debts acquired in good times.

It's no use relying on business leaders or government to save us from the consequences of folly. Each of us must be his own physician. If we will diagnose our condition and prescribe the remedy promptly, we can enjoy permanent economic and financial health.—News (Van Nuys, Calif.)

HOOVER AND 1936

What to do with ex-presidents, a problem that long has interested the country, is right now agitating considerably that part of the country which is embraced by the Republican party.

The source of the current agitation is the sole living former President Herbert Hoover. What is the G. O. P. to do with him, or to him? Bosses, big and little, and the rank and file, too, want to know.

At the moment Mr. Hoover seems to be in the unique position where his friends are afraid openly to endorse him for re-nomination and his foes fear openly to oppose him. The professional political bosses in the party, of course, desire to sink him without a trace. They never did like him. Many plain voters in the party think he was a failure in the office of chief executive. They think his name is indelibly linked with the depression that he would have no chance to be re-elected next year.

On the other hand, there are multitudes in the party, including some of the leaders, who believe that he is fundamentally sound in his economic views, and that he did not have a fair chance while he was president.

The increasing frequency of the Hoover statements on political and economic issues naturally has brought to the fore the question of the former president's intentions. Is he preparing to be a candidate for the Republican nomination in 1937? If not, is he expecting to be drafted?

Washington hears that later in the summer he will issue a formal statement stating that he is not seeking the nomination. But such an announcement would not clear up the situation entirely. Unless he declared that he was not a candidate, would not be a candidate, and would not accept the nomination would still be open, and he still would have to be considered as a possibility.

The late President Coolidge's "I do not choose to run in 1928" statement was a puzzle throughout the pre-convention period in that year, and to this day no one knows definitely what meaning Mr. Coolidge intended to convey. He never could be induced to elaborate on it or clarify it. No one knows better than Mr. Hoover the confusion the ambiguous Coolidge statement engendered.

It is a good deal to expect of Mr. Hoover that he should declare nearly a year in advance of the convention that he would not accept the nomination, though he might state he was not a candidate. Circumstances might develop which would improve greatly the possibility of his being nominated, and he hardly would desire to shut the door in his own face. There is little doubt that the former president would like to be given another chance in the presidency.

The politicians, always opposed to Mr. Hoover, who already are counting him out of the Republican picture of 1936, may be a little premature.—Houston Post

And another habit Rufus had—very seldom wore shoes. Down in the country he always went barefoot, but sometimes when he came to Eagle Lake he'd wear shoes.

Frequently, however, he came to town just as he went in the country—barefoot and with his trousers rolled up.

TRIP THROUGH THE
FAIR AT SAN DIEGO

An interesting example of a new form of public entertainment—the sound slide film—has been received by B. H. McElhinney, local Ford dealer.
