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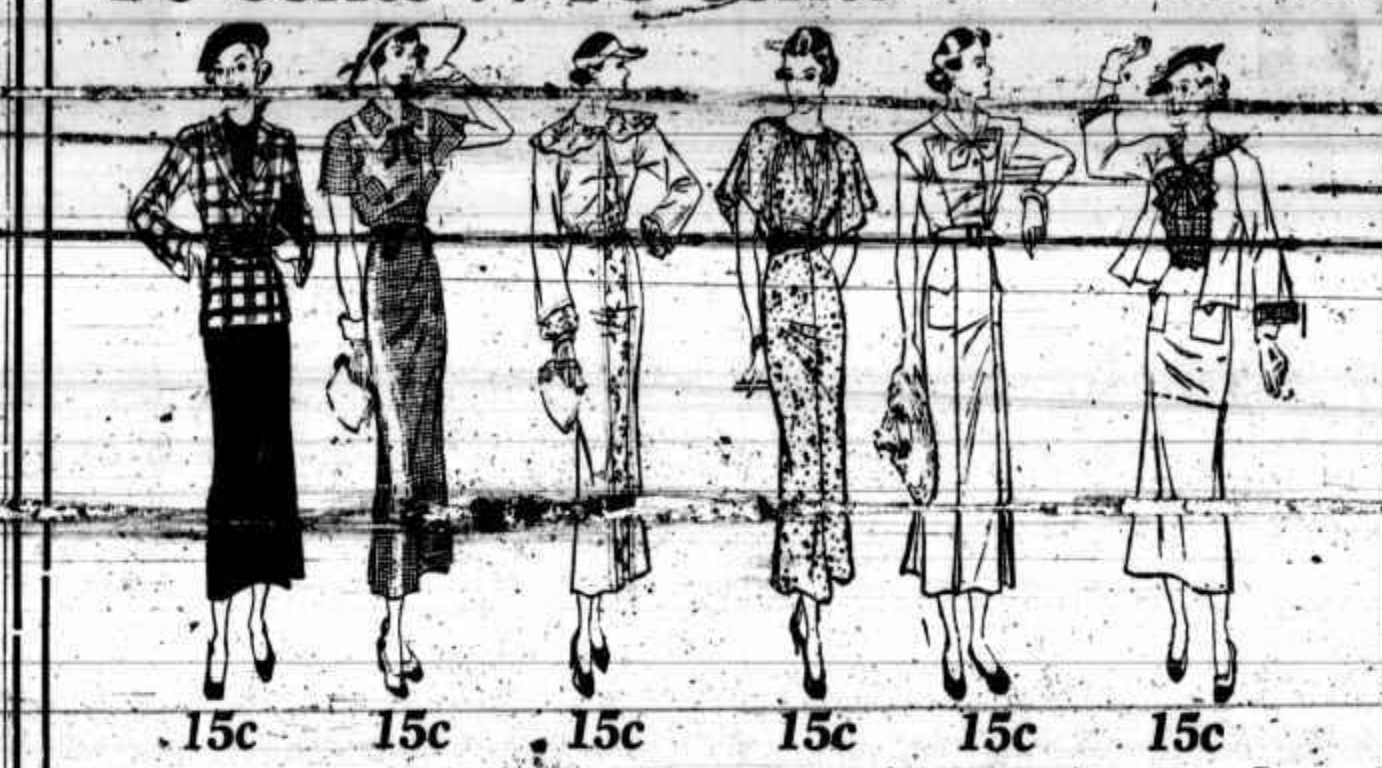

Witness Pop Joel, Jose Maria Rod-
riguez and Jose Brenon left them
to make the trip to Natchitoches
with the said eight horses. Four
other horses belonging to the wit-
nesses and one to Jose Brenon were
carried along.

"After being shown a pocket book
containing papers, and a package
he was asked in Spanish if he
knew the man who had been ac-
cused. Henrique Kurkieko appeared
before him with the interpreter and
the two undersigned witnesses who
are known to the undersigned.

"On being asked in Spanish to
tell when and with what motive he
joined company with Pop Joel, Jose
Maria and Brenon, the witness re-
plied that when he was at Natchi-
toches in the month of September
last, Pop Joel said that he wanted
to go to Trinidad in order to find
some one who would trade him
some horses for some merchandise.

"He offered to pay the witness if
he would go along and work for him
and that he would make the same
offer to Jose Brenon. They left on
that trip on the 14th or 15th of the
month of September, taking with
them two bundles of merchandise.

"Jose Maria came along with them,
and he helped with the horses.

"On being asked in Spanish to
name the person to whom he had
delivered the goods, and specify the
name, the day, the month and the
year as well as the number of the
horses he received in payment there-
of, to state what persons were
present and to tell all that he knew
about the matter, the witness re-
plied that Miguel Quin received
the two bundles in a place about
seven leagues from the town of
Trinidad, where the said Quin had
some horses on hand. He does not
remember the exact date, but he
thinks it was about the last of
September or the first day of Octo-
ber last, when Pop Joel received
eighty horses and mules and an as-
saulted him to take them in pay-
ment for the two bundles of mer-
chandise. Pop Joel was to have paid
in money for the rest of them an
amount equal to what Quin owed
him for the horses he had sold him
along in order to work on both Pop
Joel's and the aforesaid Quin's ac-
count by herding the horses while
Jose Maria Rodriguez was to do the
same. To the latter he was to pay
a salary of twelve pesos a month
during the trip; and besides that,
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him to pay him the balance of the

Fields Can Be Freed Of Cotton Root Rot Disease, Says Authority

Considerable cotton has died in
the fields in the Eagle Lake terri-
tory this summer, apparently from
root rot. The increase of the dis-
ease on many farms is giving the
farmers alarm concerning future
crops.

Dr. Tashenhaus of the A. & M.
College has been experimenting for
several years with the cotton root
rot disease. He states that in his be-
lief he has solved the problem of
root rot. The disease is caused by
a fungus which attacks the roots of
the cotton plant. He says that five years will
be required to rid the field entirely
of root rot.

He explains the disease as a fun-
gus growth and says that it travels
through the ground by living on the
dead roots of the previous year.

It is not absolutely necessary to
take all the cotton off the field at
once, but it can be divided and
planted in new rows. The cotton
plant will grow in a new row, and
the fungus will not be able to reach
it. He says that a man has 25 acres
of cotton in the Eagle Lake terri-
tory, and he has been growing it for
five years and so on until the
cotton is free of the disease.

Following this procedure, he says,
the farmer will have his land as
good as new for cotton.

Farmers of this section, who this
summer have spots of root rot cot-
ton in their fields, should immedi-
ately get in touch with Dr. Tashen-
haus, at the A. & M. College, and
get from him first-hand, full in-
formation on how to rid their fields
of the disease.

W. C. Reed, Eagle Lake School,
Superintendent, Urges Defeat
Of School Book Amendment

On tomorrow there is to be held
in Texas an important election.
The voters will cast their ballots on
several amendments to the State
Constitution. The amendments will
be numbered and will appear in the
same numerical order on the bal-
lot as in the constitution.

It is with direct attention to the
trends of public education to the
last amendment on the list—a dual
amendment, No. 7. It is a dual pro-
posal. In one section it proposes
that in any manner which the
Legislature may by law direct and
be so applied. This would sub-
stitute this \$27,000,000 fund to political
juggling in the Legislature.

It is the most active and powerful
political group getting the largest
share of it.

Altogether, this proposal seems to
be fraught with greater danger to
the public school system of this
State than any other public
proposal which has been made in
this generation. It strikes at the
heart of the system. It can not
therefore, too strongly urge that
the friends of the public schools ap-
pear at this amendment, the last
one on the ticket.
