Effort Started For Planting Better Grade And A Uniform Cotton In South Texas

A meeting held by the farmers of the black land section of Texas was held in Temple recently to determine the type of cotton that they would like to be planted from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

The purpose is to try to raise a better quality cotton to create a demand from foreign countries for the superior product. Years ago, Texas produced one of the best qualities of cotton raised in the United States, but in recent years this quality has gradually been falling off.

After much careful consideration, "Acacia" cotton was the type that was selected for use in this plan.

The Black Land Counties of the state, Elmer Zach of the Winchester section was the Fayette County delegate. A. J. Elter represented Lavaca County and L. F. Winkelman represented Washington County.

It is hoped that the plan will be successful in placing on the market during the season of 1936. The County Agent will soon find some localities in Fayette County and attempt to get the farmers of that particular section started in for next year. If this block of acreage is secured all cotton will be allowed to go through the plan.
