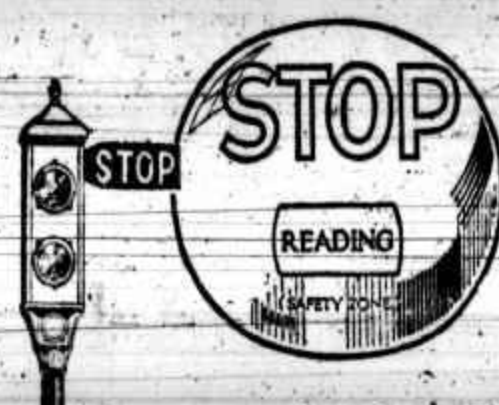

THE ARCHIVES OF BEXAR

When Business of the Texas Government, From 1727 To 1835, Was Centered In San Antonio.

(Note: This is one of a series of articles taken from the 300 special volumes of the Bexar Archives, which cover all periods of Texas history, from the earliest days of the Spanish missionaries in the province of Texas, through the colonial era, to the present. This series of articles presents interesting excerpts from a number of these family collections, some chosen for their intrinsic significance in the development of the state of Texas, others for their purely human interest in portraying personalities, economic conditions and social life.)

The courage of Sarah Hibbins, delineated in the following account of her capture by the Indians, taken from Frank Brown's Annals of Travis county, part of the family archives collection in the University of Texas library, exemplifies the bravery of the pioneer women of Texas.

"The Hibbins' family were among the early comers, settling in De Witt's colony on the Guadalupe. Mr. Brown wrote: 'In 1815 Mrs. Hibbins went on a visit to Truett, where she started home, coming by water, and arrived at Houston in January, 1816, in company with her mother. Her husband met them there with a wagon to convey them to the colony. They had crossed the Colorado and were nearing home when a party of Indians rushed upon them and instantly killed Mr. Hibbins and the mother. They took one infant and the other three

she continued her travels down the river valley the next day until she saw some home cattle. She remained with these until they started home, and then followed them. In the evening she became exhausted from hunger and fatigue. Knowing she must be near the settlement she commenced hallooing as loud as she could. There were some men in the bottom who heard her, but not distinguishing the voice, they concluded it was Indians and would not answer.

"Late in the evening, the good woman without uttering a word went into the camp of some rangers near Hornsby's and threw herself on the ground. It seemed that the rangers were alarmed, and she was immediately removed to the house of Reuben Hornsby, where she was supplied with clothing and food.

"After hearing her story, and as soon as they could take some refreshments, Capt. Tomlinson and his men, mounted their horses at night, leaving her down, with her children on each side, throwing a buffalo robe over them. Two large Indians roared then lie down by them, one on each side, as guards. The infant was a sucking babe, and when hungry would cry. The Indians took the babe from her, and she thought killed it.

"After crossing the Colorado the Indians allowed Mrs. Hibbins and her child to lie by themselves, thinking escape possible. The first night after crossing the river, they camped near where Austin now stands. Here, for the first time, Mrs. Hibbins and her child were permitted to lie together, without a guard. She laid awake until the Indians and child were asleep, when she again arose and crept from the camp. Near by was a creek whose banks were steep. She went down the channel of the creek. There was running water in it. Having traveled, as she supposed, very near the camp, she found herself very near the camp, by hearing her child call out, 'Oh! Mama! Should she go back? Should she listen to matters promising, and again place herself within the grasp of the savages. She reflected that if she were to return she could do nothing but wait until the savages came, and she knew the channel of Shoal creek down to the Colorado. She passed through brush, vines, and water all night.

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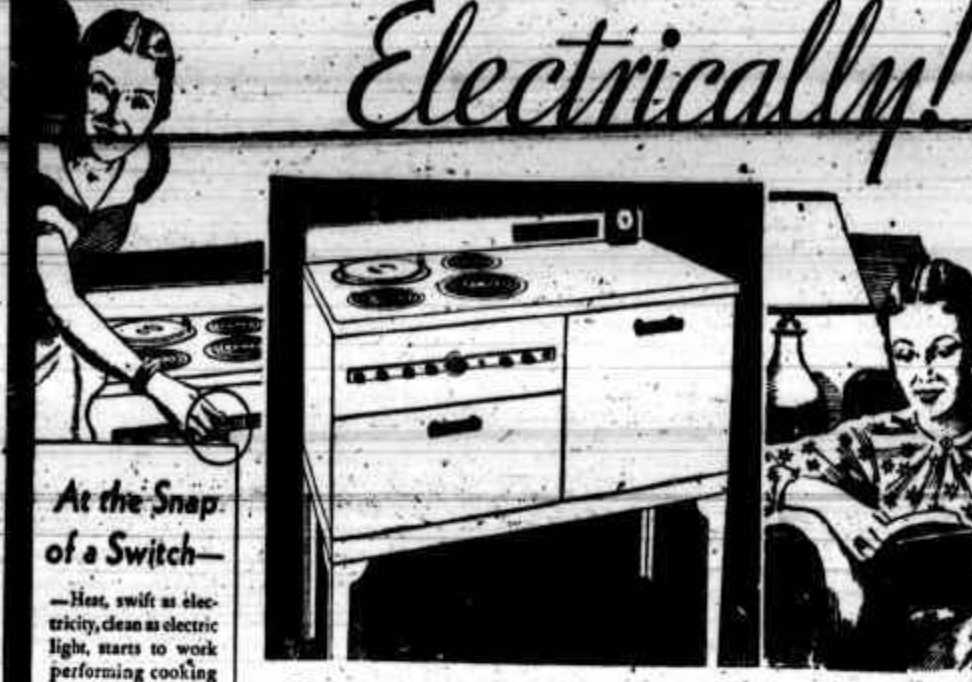
