ERITREA: ITALY'S 30-YEAR OLD COLONY ON RED SEA

The recent outbreak of hostilities in the East has attracted the attention of the world to the Red Sea.

What is now Eritrea began in 1870, says an article by Harold Lechman, in the September, 1935, National Geographic Magazine. When the Italian Rubattino Steamship Company needed a loading station in the Red Sea and bought the Bay of Assab and its miserable oasis from a petty local ruler, the Sultan of Massawa.

By 1879 a small Italian military force had landed in Assab and hoisted the Italian flag in this corner of the world. Today that flag is still flying from the mast of the Mare Erythraeum, as the old Romans called the waters of this part of the world.

I journeyed from Assab to Massawa and until then I had never really known what heat was. Benefit Payments by Government On 1935 Cotton

(By W. H. Young, County Agent)

Who is eligible to receive benefit payments? All cotton grown on contracted farms in the up to the amount of your Bankhead allotment.

Growers of cotton on non-contracted farms can make applications for benefit payments by signing an agreement to contract the farm in 1936 and upon compliance of the contract will receive the benefit payments.

How to proceed? Non-contracted farms will be handled exclusively at the county agent's office.

Contracted farmers should mail to the county agent's office all buyers' invoices for both land and cotton up to the amount of the Bankhead allotment. The office will fill out in triplicate government form G. A. P-1 for each separate day's sales and will return these forms to you by mail. Take forms G. A. P-1 to the different buyers and have them sign each form. Give the buyer one carbon copy, retain one carbon copy for the producer, then deliver the original of the form or to the person who made application for the Bankhead allotment.
