Government's New Four-Year Cotton Farmers' Contract Has Been Outlined

The AAA's determination to push for long-time control of major crops despite pending controversy over the farm act's constitutionality was emphasized Tuesday by publication of a new, four-year cotton program. It aims at production of 11,000,000 bales in 1939.

The AAA now has, in rapid succession, launched four-year control programs for wheat, tobacco, rice and cotton. A two-year contract has been prepared for corn-hog producers.

Officials predicted some method of continuing crop control would be found, regardless of the Supreme Court's ruling on the agricultural adjustment act.

The cotton contract provides for a reduction in "base" acreage from 45,500,000 to 44,500,000 acres. Contract signers will reduce acreage 30 to 35 per cent for 1936, compared to 25 to 30 per cent for 1935.

Contract signers will be made at the rate of 5 cents a pound (approximately \$8.60 an acre). Three payments were provided: 1936 contract on two bases, totaling 4 cents a pound.

Changes will be made in division of benefit payments between landlords and tenants, allowing some tenants more money. They also will furnish the land will receive 27 1/2 per cent, the provider of work tools and equipment, 12 1/2 per cent, and the remaining 50 per cent will be divided in the proportion that the cotton or its proceeds are divided.

AAA Administrator Chester C. Davis expressed belief the emergency which resulted in the 1933 plan-up has passed.

"We have taken into account," he said, "the unique position which cotton holds in our national life in drafting the new contract."

The last official crop estimate placed 1935 production at 11,141,000 bales. The AAA has planned its program for 11,500,000 bales and 14,000,000 acres were retired from cotton this year.

Seeking a reduction of the nation's huge cotton surplus, officials have predicted that world consumption of American cotton this season would exceed production. Private sources have estimated that exports for 1935 would hit 8,000,000 bales, an increase of more than 1,000,000 over last season. Domestic consumption was estimated at 6,000,000 bales.

Similar demand next year, it was said, with a crop of about the same size, would enable a substantial reduction in surplus.

W. L. Clayton of Anderson, Clayton & Co. voiced the opinion of Houston cotton men Tuesday when he expressed disapproval of the government's four-year plan of acreage control, announced from Washington overnight.

"I do not believe in the government encouraging farmers not to raise cotton or any other product," he said. "In other words, I am opposed to agriculture being controlled from Washington."

Most Houston cotton men declined to comment on the program in the absence of certain details. Some pointed out that any curtailment of cotton production affects economically a large number of wage earners not directly engaged in cotton production, as well as industries such as ship, cotton mills, warehouses, railroads and truck and steamship lines.
