TEXAS COUNTY OFFICERS PLACED ON SALARY BASIS

County and district officers of Texas were transferred from the fee basis of compensation to salaries Wednesday as a law passed last fall by the Legislature became effective.

The fee system, subject of much criticism in some sections of the state, has been in effect nearly 100 years. The change was ordered by the electorate last summer through adoption of a constitutional amendment after several previous attempts had failed.

Payment of salaries was mandatory in counties having a population of more than 20,000 and optional in smaller counties. The new law directs county commissioners to fix salaries in fees in 1935 and the maximum allowed under the general law.

SKILLED TRADES NOW OFFER OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH

Opportunities for young men who contemplate careers as skilled craftsmen are excellent, according to Walter B. Picken, author of "New Careers for Youth."

"Industry wants to know," he says in the Rotarian Magazine, "where tomorrow's skilled craftsmen are coming from. Finding new employers are beginning to open up apprentice training courses to help meet the most acute shortage of skilled labor this country has ever known."

Behind the mechanical industries need 3,400 highly skilled workers each year, merely to replace those who drop out because of sickness, accident, death, promotion, retirement and old age. This calls for allowance for the growth of industries, not for the birth of new ones.

"Employers in other industrial parts of the country are today faced with similar skilled labor shortages. Foresighted in installing new machines and methods to cut costs in hard times, employers have been extraordinarily short-sighted in training and retaining workers to utilize these results."

"In America's metal industries alone," Dr. Picken continues, "at least 18,000 skilled workers are urgently wanted in plants operating today at far less than capacity. As business improves, production will drop proportionately. If it approaches the levels of the Twenties, there will be a shortage of 123,000 skilled workers in the metal industry."

"While not quite so acute elsewhere, the shortage still plagues other industries. We know two important facts: (1) Skilled workers are wanted in all fields where new machines and methods have improved beyond the capacities of the older workers; and (2) in American factories other than those in the metal fields, at least 100,000 skilled workers must be found each year to replace those dropping out, as they did in 1930. But in mind that this estimate does not include a single skilled worker in the clothing industries, the publishing business, breweries and distilleries, railroads and marine shipping. Nor does it include such other enormous fields as retailing and agriculture."

"Opportunities will probably be more numerous in the Southwest, where the new industries are being developed. New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin. There will be thousands of jobs elsewhere, where new workers and wages, many of which have already reported acute shortages."
