NEAR BERNARDO PASSES

Mrs. Louis Meyer passed out at this life at her home 1033 Bernarado on Thursday, January 29, at 5 a. m., at the age of 72 years, a month and 15 days. She was laid to rest in the Lutheran Cemetery at Mentz on Friday afternoon, January 24th.

Rev. W. A. Flachmeier, pastor of the Lutheran churches at Columbus and Mentz, conducted the services. Singers were furnished by the choir at Columbus.

Nora Dunlavy was born at Mentz October 5, 1863. On December 14, 1882, she was married to Louis Meyer. To this union four children were born, a daughter and three sons, one son preceding her in death seven years ago.

Mrs. Meyer was a life-long member of the Mentz Lutheran Church, her pastor, Rev. Mr. Flachmeier, comforting her and soothing her on many occasions during her illness. She had been in failing health for several years. Last April she underwent an operation, since which time she has been an invalid and confined to her bed most of the time.

Mrs. Meyer is survived by her grief-stricken husband, two sons, Toby of Victoria and Arthur of Bernardo, and a daughter, Mrs. Peter Fry of Bernardo, six grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. W. J. Meyer of Mentz and Mrs. Nettie Meyer of Freburg, and two brothers, Edwin and Alex Dunlavy of Mentz.

Her grave was a huge mass of beautiful flowers, tokens of esteem and friendship brought by friends and relatives.
