300 CITIES JOIN CENTENNIAL

YEAR PARADE IN TEXAS

The Texas Centennial, with cele-

brations of varied nature planned

in more than 100 cities, has de-

veloped into the greatest state-wide

observance in the nation's history.

The celebration not only reflect

the glorious history of the state but

they also serve to focus world wide

attention on the agricultural, min-

eral, industrial and recreational re-

sources of the Lone Star State.

Texas is on parade in 1936 with

scores of historical celebrations.

Centennial pageants, harvest fe-

stivals, fairs and stock shows, jub-

ilees and fiestas, Dallas with its

great Central exposition will enter-

tain millions of visitors and other

expositions will be staged in Fort

Worth and Austin.

Historical observances center in

San Antonio and Houston with in-

teresting events also planned at

Washington-on-Brazos, Sinton and

Tam, El Paso, Kingsville, Del Rio,

Marshall, Berville, Groesbeck and

Mexia, D'Hanis, San Augustine,

and many other cities.

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Jasper, Kerrville, Cotulla, Coleman,

West Columbia and Graham. His-

torical episodes will be commemor-

ated also in Huntsville, Crockett,

Goliad, Victoria, Belton and Free-

port.

Gay and colorful harvest festivals

will be held at Crystal City, Plain-

view, Raymondville, Jacksonville,

Yoakum, Mt Pleasant, Weatherford,

Tyler, Gilmer, Cuero, Mission, Wes-

laco and Center. Fairs and stock

shows planned with Centennial

spirit will be held at San Angelo,

Fort Worth, Rock Springs, Ederne,

Tyler, Ennis, Mt. Pleasant, Marfa,

Wharton, Yorktown, Pearsall and

Beaumont.

Celebrations centering around

aquatic events will be staged at

Brownsville, Port Lavaca, Corpus

Christi, Port Aransas, Port Stock-

ton, Brownwood and Sweetwater.

Events of varied nature are slated

for Gonzales, Austin, Seguin, Bel-

ton, Georgetown, Edna, Paris, Kil-

gore, Bowie, Big Spring, Crockett,

Vernon, San Marcos, Fredericks-

burg, Slaton, Brady, Bastrop, Eagle

Pass, Colorado, Perryton, Hender-

son and Anson.

Of interest far beyond the bor-

ders of Texas will be the western

celebrations—pioneer days, round-

ups and rodeos—planned at Plain-

view, Floydada, Midland, Canadita,

Stamford, Pecos, Falfurrias, Borger,

Bowie, Clarendon, Belton, Comfort,

Tulla, Big Spring and San Angelo.

The Centennial observance was

opened last November with a cele-

bration at Gonzales which has been

followed by celebrations at San An-

tonio, El Paso, Livingston, Brown-

wood, Dallas, Putnam and Galves-

ton.
