H. E. Club Discusses Diseases

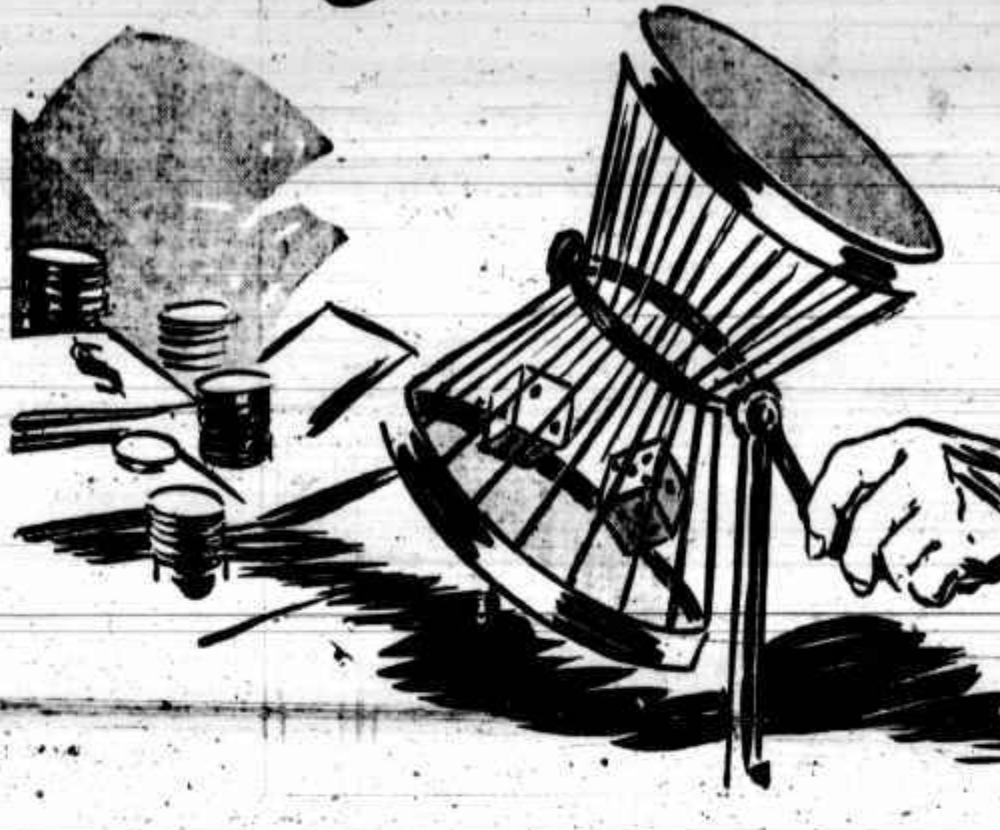
The home economics club met February 27. The meeting was called to order by the president, Edrie Stallman. We discussed the care and prevention of influenza, pneumonia and mumps.

I was born in the wildest jungle of the darkest part of Africa, and

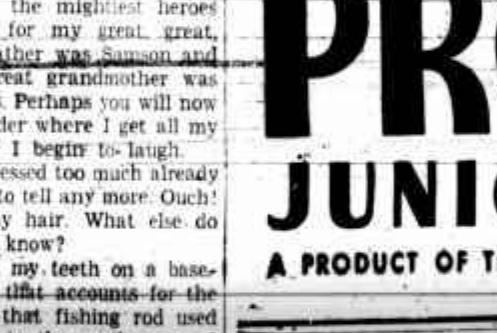
