Mr. Roberts says he looks for the cottage court to take the big one.

They went fishing at Guaymas, spent most of their time fishing, killing a number of birds, among them a curlew or water turkey, which the Mexican boys on the boat are for dinner. But what won't they eat Mr. Roberts' lake. Later on, when they would kill a deer, the Spanish Indians with them would take the intestine fat and fill their pockets with it. Riding along, they saw a deer, and Mr. Roberts said he had killed the largest fish on the trip, one weighing 110 pounds. Ernst von Lengere landed one almost at the same time, and they weighed 80 pounds. The fish are shipped to all parts of the United States. A carload was shipped the day they arrived in New Orleans. No nets are used in this water, he says, for the bay is several hundred feet deep. Practically all fishing is done, from dugouts from cottonwood trees. One of these dugouts was used as a freight boat up the coast for years.

Receiving a wire from Chester to come to Ures, they changed their plans, taking a boat at Guaymas for Lower California to hunt sheep and mule deer and have a look at the Seri Indians. This Indian never has a home, Mr. Roberts said. They sleep wherever night overtakes them. They eat cactus and mule deer mutton flesh, if it is found dead. They are not warlike, but don't mind killing it they can do so at no risk to themselves. They paint and use face paint.

Stocker left the party at Guaymas, so Ernst, Fritz and Light (Roberts) had a great time making it to Ures, since he was the only one in the party now able to speak any Spanish. He managed to spill enough of it, he said, to inquire road directions and to get something to eat. Ures is the old capital of Sonora.

The party carried a letter from the Governor of Sonora to the Mayor of Ures, asking that he show them courtesy due to them as his friends. They had reached the Governor in Guaymas, but, on arrival at Ures, were met by Frank Arvizue, a Mexican ranchman. Frank had

spent five years in this country going to school. "I want to say," Mr. Roberts said, "that in all of my thirty years that I have been in this country that I have always found the Mexican ranchman to be of the best. Frank's ranch covers 90,000 acres, for which he pays \$200 a year. The people of Mexico as Mr. Mexico is at 2.35 to one. Frank's land is cheap. ARCHIVES OF BEXAR
When Business of the Texas Government, From
1727 To 1835, Was Centered In San Antonio.

A series of weekly articles taken from the *San Antonio Express* by the University of Texas. This collection, considered the greatest single historical treasure on the North American continent, has been catalogued by the University of Texas, published by The University of Texas. It consists of 400,000 pages of original Spanish handwritten documents, mostly from the archives of the Spanish and Mexican governments, for the province of Texas and the Department of Texas, which covered almost all of what is now the State of Texas. For the period from 1521 to 1800 after Texas became a separate province of New Spain, to 1836, to the Texas Revolution, the series of articles consists principally of quotations from the documents, many of which have heretofore been inaccessible. The reveal for the first time what actually transpired during the century in which Texas was transformed from a wilderness, inhabited by Indians, to a state (and then an independent American republic).

Young Stephen F. Austin, "father" of Anglo-American Texas, magnanimously gave up his right of Mexican officials in charge of the province of Texas. It is apparent from documents in the Austin papers, both collections of which are in the library of The University of Texas. Complimentary terms are applied to the young man, who passed between these various officials and Austin and between the officials themselves in regard to the project of colonization.

The death of Moses Austin in 1821, Stephen, reluctantly accepted his father's plan and continued negotiations with the Mexican authorities.

A letter written by Governor Antonio Martínez to Amador de Azaro on August 19-1821, reveals the extent of development in the colonization project to that date. The letter is a copy of the original copy found in the archives of The University of Texas.

"Complying with a petition filed by Don Amador de Azaro, the Excellent Provincial Council has given its consent for the immigration of three hundred families from Louisiana into this province. The Don Joaquin de Arrondo, Don Erasmo Segura notified Don Moises Austin, who had been notified from Natchitoches of the council's decision. The settlement is now returning from that city accompanied by Don Estevan Austin, son of Don Moises. Because of the fact that the settlement of families who possess qualities not to be enviable, has taken charge of the project."

Don Estevan Austin is accompanied by sixteen new settlers, of them appearing to be honest and industrious—I have permitted him in compliance with his request, to select the place where he intends to establish a settlement in order that he may explore the country and select the territory most favorable to agriculture and industry. He is to inform the government of the place he selects so that the commission which is to make the distribution of land to the new families, they will probably arrive next December. By

TROPICAL FISH FORM
FASCINATING HOBBY

Keeping tropical fish is becoming an increasingly popular American hobby. Boats and planes rush New York and other large cities with thousands of brilliantly colored inhabitants of distant rivers and seas to become living ornaments in American homes.

"The armored catfish from South America has the reputation of being the most easily kept of all tropical toy fish. It thrives in moderate temperature and on a variety of foods. It has overlapping barb scales, and a small mouth opening with typical catfish barbels.

"Smallest of tiny fish to bear its young alive is the American goldfish, while the male goldfish provides now their three quarters of an inch in length.
