FINE FISHING LAKES

He has also secured many fish from hatcheries, and having his different ponds so arranged, they are already well filled with choice fish. He feeds the fish once each week, and the lakes being furnished with fresh water from a nearby well, they are fat and finer than the average fish.

His bass lake is separated from other waters, so that the smaller fish of other breeds are not devoured by the larger bass, and for this reason the fish increase in his lakes has been marvelous.

Mr. Burger is this spring adding a stock of bull frogs. Protecting them from turtles and snakes, and fish that eat frog eggs, in another year he says he'll have more frog legs than he'll know what to do with.
