**FARM WORK PROGRAM TO
BEGIN IN COUNTY MONDAY**
(By W. H. Young)
Work on the new farm program
to begin Monday, April 27th. At
this time commitment will com-
mence the work of filling out Form
SR 1 work sheets, on each farm
where farmers desire to co-operate.
The first step in the program is
to fill out the work sheets and
program and the work sheets must
be filled out in order to establish
your farm base.
All third and fourth tenants will
file a work sheet with the land-
owner. The landowner will file a
work sheet for the land that he
cultivates and also for all land
cultivated by his hands. The com-
mitment of about 100,000 acres
and balance with the total base
acres of the entire farm or tract
of land owned by the landlord.
Remember that there is no obli-
gation to your part when you fill
out a work sheet on your farm.
Have this done and then when you
have acreage is worked out it is
easy to get approval, you can
make an application for a grant.
Get in touch with the committee
nearest you.
Arrangements have been made to
conduct three demonstrations in
