Science Points Way When Politics Fail

"Based on the average domestic price of 16 cents a pound during the year, American manufacturers paid out in the neighborhood of 23 million dollars for tung oil in 1935. by giving men and women an opportunity to find employment by the production of new forms of wealth necessary to civilization. We are more familiar with the development of the soy bean, another Chinese product, and the use of this material not only for food for men and cattle but for the restoration of nitrogen in the soil and for the manufacture of many essential parts of modern automobiles, paints, etc.

We are perhaps less familiar with the experiments of H. A. Gardner of the Institute of Plant and Varian Research, on perilla and other new oil seed crops. Experiments with the Perilla plant have been conducted by Dr. Gardner since 1917; samples of the seed being distributed to about 30 States. The oil of the perilla seed is now imported from Japan and Manchuria and the refuse of the oil cake in Japan is used to fertilize the mulberry trees. It is possible to aridate this plant to American conditions, particularly in our Southern States. It may easily become a vital industrial element and replace cotton in various regions where the modern cultivation and harvesting of cotton may ultimately be found to be economically unimportant.

Dr. Frank K. Cameron, of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, N. C., read an extremely interesting paper on experiments made on the method of cultivating cotton in the Carolinas, in which the cotton plant is used to produce Cellulose for the immovable uses which modern industry has for this product. This experiment of Dr. Cameron is still incomplete, largely due to the lack of funds in the University of North Carolina, but enough has already been established to prove that this experiment definitely belongs in the category of hopeful experiments. Dr. Cameron said in part:

"For some years it has appeared improbable that lint cotton could be produced economically in the South Atlantic States, particularly in the Carolinas. It is probable that the types that are produced there to advantage, agriculturally, are not those desired by the adjacent mills. The textiles for which these types are best adapted are being displaced by rayons. The character of the terrain does not permit the use of tractors, mechanical pickers, modern methods of insect control by aeroplane, etc. And for various reasons, more desirable than these, the cotton industry in the lower delta of the Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arizona and California."

It appears that a population of perhaps 3 million, whose very existence depends upon it, must find another crop to replace the to-be-abandoned cotton. No such crop has been suggested. It would be almost ridiculously difficult, if at all possible, to remove so large a population to new locations and return the land to forest. A hopeful suggestion is that the cotton industry be transferred to the lower delta of the Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas, Arizona and California."

What more reasonable position can be taken than that assumed by Professor Cameron? Political action or academic theories based on emotions rather than the intellect, has nothing to do with the vital problems of a changing industrial society.
