**JULY 30, 1912.**

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### COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT WOOTEN INDORSES PAT BULLOCK FOR STATE SUPERINTENDENT

I feel it my duty to say that I am opposed to many things in the program and policies of State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Mr. L. A. Woods, his High School Tuition and State Aid laws, particularly, discriminate against Colorado County. The qualifications for the disbursement of these funds have discontinued \$1000.00 per year tuition aid for rural students to accredited high schools of this county and the \$17,000.00 per capita share of the Equalization Fund this county should receive it actually receives about \$7000.00. The balance of it is going to other sections of the state, favored by road conditions, for the purchase of buses and paying operation costs. The people of Colorado County are paying their share of this \$17,000.00 per capita share of the Equalization Fund. The rural teacher's salary and the child who is in greater need of outside assistance have been sacrificed for this big transportation program.

Mr. Woods' letter to the Legislature, January 18, 1933, proves that he was opposed to the per capita apportionment being above \$1000.00 and that he was in favor of a large increase in the Equalization Fund. The disbursement of which he controls. The present increase in the PER CAPITA is due to the efforts of THE STATE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION committee working with the STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

I am endorsing the platform and views of A. A. (Pat) Bullock as compared with the policies of L. A. Woods and I am confident Mr. Bullock has the better understanding of the conditions facing the schools of South Texas.

Mr. Bullock is capable. He served as director of Mr. Woods' Rural Aid Division and recently as State Director of the Federal Emergency Education Program, resigning the latter to become a candidate for the State Superintendency.

I believe a vote for Mr. Bullock will be to the best interests of the schools of Colorado County.

**ARCHIVES OF BEXAR**  
When Business of the Texas Government, From 1727 To 1835, Was Centered In San Antonio.

(Note: This is one of a series of books taken from the three hundred special collections of family archives in the University of Texas Library. The collections cover all periods of Texas history, from the earliest times to the present. The series is being published by the University of Texas Library.

The constantly increasing control of individual and corporate rights by the Federal government is a subject of bitter discussion at present. Spanish Texans were so accustomed to their paternalistic form of government that they took government control of public health, medical treatment and hospitalization as a matter of daily routine. Records in the Bexar Archives of the University of Texas show that the health of Spaniards in Texas received considerable government attention. On April 13, 1804, for instance, the king issued a royal order giving instructions for the performance of the Charcaran operation. A few years later another royal order was circulated explaining the method of preventing infantile paralysis. The dreaded scourge of World War days—Spanish influenza—was not unknown in Spanish Texas days. On March 21, 1808, the Commandant General wrote the Governor of Texas: "We have read in your letter that there is an epidemic of influenza in this town. Consequently I am hereby advising you to order Doctor Jayme Cueta to draw up a simple method for checking the spread of the epidemic to other towns." By April 18, 1808, the epidemic had been completely controlled.

Since there was only one army hospital in Texas and no civilian institutions of that nature, on April 17, 1809, the Commandant General issued a command permitting civilians to be taken to the "squad army hospital, where the mattresses on the forty cots were not changed until they rotted away."

The Commandant General was ever mindful for any danger to his subjects. On June 22, 1809, for instance, he wrote the Governor of Texas, saying: "Since it has been learned that bubonic plague is at present destroying the city of Vera Cruz, I am hereby warning Your Lordship to issue the strictest orders to the effect that any ship coming from that port to the coast of Texas is to be quarantined, and

no person or article allowed to land." On July 6, 1809, the commandant at Trinidad reported that his troops were suffering bilious fevers and that there were "no soldiers available for service." The Governor sent Don Pedro Larrague a physician to Trinidad, and advised the commandant: "As soon as the settlers recover, you must try to clear the settlement of tinea, if attribute to this cause the fever which is prevalent there."

Physicians and surgeons were extremely scarce in Texas. There was usually a midwife, who was compelled by law to post a large sign over her door, to take care of women's afflictions. Men generally had to rely on Don Jayme Cueta, or his assistant, the only doctor in Texas. Sometimes the barber was summoned to bleed or operate on someone. When no one else could be found, the Spaniards resorted to an Indian medicine man. There is recorded in Bexar Archives a case of a fight between two soldiers, one wounding the other with a small knife. A sergeant reported: "An Atacapa Indian, whom I sent for, sucked the wound on said Serbin, drawing some blood, and he has continued to doctor him with a certain herb, making me understand by signs that the patient will not die."

The most dreaded scourge in Texas both to Spaniards and Indians was smallpox. Part of a royal order dated May 20, 1804, reads: "The King has had the gratifying news of the safe arrival on the American continent of our overseas commission whose purpose is to disseminate among his beloved subjects of the Indies the marvelous discovery of vaccination, after having introduced it in the Canary Islands in Puerto Rico; and although I expect the director and the other individuals commissioned will carry out their obligations in strict conformity with the law, they undertake to make known its use in the principal cities of his vast dominions, in conformity to the method which they will explain; you will aid them in this important undertaking, in compliance with the circular of September 10 of the year just past."
