AUGUST 15TH DEAD LINE FOR COTTON DIFFERENCE

(By W. H. Young, County Agent) Black-eyed peas are considered cowpeas if harvested for canning or processing; however, they are considered as a commercial truck crop, and are classed as soil depleting. Of course, farmers are allowed to harvest such peas for home feed, food or seed. In no case can diverted acres planted to these crops be contracted to commercial concern and products sold. In such cases black-eyed peas take the same classification as soy beans sold to the crusher.

JUDGING TEAM PLACES SECOND AT SHORT COURSE

The Colorado County 4-H Club Boys' poultry judging team placed second in competition with 15 teams from various counties of the state in the judging contest held at the Farmers' Short Course at College Station.

McLennan county placed first with a score of 1008 points, noting the Colorado county boys by only 2 points. Our score was 1006 points.

Milton Kiesel placed high man for the entire state; his score was 390 points. His nearest competitor was Cecil Woodward, a member of the winning team, with a score of 385 points.

The Colorado county team was composed of the following 4-H Club Boys from the New Bielau school: Milton Kiesel, 390 points; Leroy Beken, 310; and Edwin Freeman, 306 points.

The club boys and the county agent take this means of thanking Mr. Frank Seifert for the use of his truck to transport the boys to the short course. We had a great time and if you doubt it, ask the opinion of Allen Grobe, president of the club, who was chief coco-afloren and handy man on the trip.

On a field tour of the county since our return from the College, we find that both weevils are destroying most of the cotton crop. Dusting with calcium arsenate, with a machine, using 3 to 6 pounds per acre at 5-day intervals for three dustings will probably get results that is, if it quits raining.

Marcus Schindler claims to have the largest weevils in the county. While making an inspection of his field, he heard him yell and running up to him found him pointing to the ground and saying, "I told you so; look, there is the granddaddy of the whole family." Just proves that sometimes we can be mistaken, for Marcus was pointing to a "hand tortoise."

If you are unable to poison for the weevil, continuous shallow cultivation until the cotton is matured is recommended by the county agent.

DUCK SHOOTING MAY BE CLOSED SEVERAL YEARS

The already limited duck shooting season may be stopped entirely for the next few years, Dr. Harry C. Oberholser, senior biologist of the United States Bureau of biological survey, indicated in a talk at Dallas Tuesday.

The continued drought and the shooting season has had such a telling effect on the fowl that the latter may be barred for several years in an effort to increase the number of ducks throughout the country, he said.

Dr. Oberholser, who revealed he is writing a book about Texas birds, said the state has at least 100 more species of birds than any other state.
