OPERATING ON A CONTINENT

Perhaps the most inspiring achievement of the Roosevelt Administration is its widespread reconstruction of the physical surface of America. Big and little, something like 500,000 projects have been undertaken—ranging from boondoggling gutters and ditches to works that rival the Panama Canal and cost 20 times as much. In this "operating" on a continent, for which the bill runs to about eight billion dollars—at least 2,000,000 persons have been given some di-rect employment, not counting the 3,500,000 now being transferred from the dole rolls to work relief.

Outstanding among the tasks have been continuation of flood control of the Mississippi and Mis-souri rivers and the extension of navigation of these rivers almost to their headwaters. The building of a bridge eight miles long across San Francisco Bay and assistance in building the bridge across the Golden Gate; in New York, the \$40,000,000 vehicular tunnel under the Hudson River, the \$60,000,000 tunnel under the East River, and the tremendous Tri-Borough Bridge.

At Eastport, Maine, the Jides are being harnessed for power on a large scale for the first time in history.

In the Southwest, work has been continued on gigantic Boulder Dam; \$100,000,000 is being expended to divert the waters of the Colorado River into a canal for the Imperial

Valley irrigated region: \$80,000,000 is going into a conduit to carry water from the Colorado through and under 250 miles of desert and mountains to the coastal regions of Southern California, thus assuring potable and irrigating water for an ultimate population of 6,000,000. A hundred million more is going into the improvement or extension of existing water supply and irrigation systems.

Rivers and harbors are under-going mass improvement at a cost of half a million—and \$60,000,000 is being spent at Chicago to turn the Illinois and Mississippi rivers from foul levers back into sparkling streams.

The Department of Agriculture has undertaken the colossal task of stopping erosion throughout the country on 50,000,000 acres of land ruined by unbalanced water flow. Some ten million acres of farm land are being returned to wilder-ness and wild life. Other millions of acres—the ultimate goal is 223,000,000—are being purchased and turned over to forest reservations. The forests have been crisscrossed with fire lanes and trails; the forest shelter belt is rising on the great plains from Texas to Canada. Not less than 500,000 people will be removed from their pur-chased barren farms and placed where they can earn their living.

Nothing but a great national crisis could have plunged the nation into such a stupendous pro-gram. There has been nothing like this present wholesale improvement and subjugation of nature within a brief time since the world began.
