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EAGLES LOSE TO HEAVIER BELLVILLE TEAM IN SEASON'S OPENING GAME FRIDAY, 6-0

In the opening football game of the 1936 season, and playing under the new lights for the first time, the Eagles lost to the much heavier Bellville Brahmas by a score of 6 to 0, here Friday night. Bellville was able to drive down the field in the first quarter for a touchdown through the hard driving runs made by their fullback, Zopolac. This boy weighs 185 pounds and is very fast for his size. The Bellville line outweighed the Eagles about 15 pounds per man, and opened wide holes for their backs to plunge through.

The Eagles were unable to get under way except for the completion of a few passes. One of these threw a scare into the Brahmas when Ray Tatum, passed to Braden for 22 yards and a first down on Bellville's 15 yard line. A penalty and completed passes prevented further advance of the ball from this point.

Paul Balas turned in a stellar defensive exhibition in the last half by outplaying the big 220 pound man against him, Raymond Waddell fought all the way as did every member of the Eagles used in the game.

Bellville offered a fine running attack, featuring Zapolac, McNutt and Long. These three boys are big and fast, and working behind the line should turn in a very good record in their district.

The game was attended by a good crowd and many favorable comments concerning the playing field and lights were heard. The high school band, drum and bugle corps, and pep squad gave good performances and all are to be commended on the splendid spirit shown.

The lineup of the two teams was as follows: Eagles, Waddell, left end; Bellbaum, left tackle; Shertan, left guard; Swearingen, center; Chasler, right guard; Bates, right tackle; Braden, right end; Powers, quarterback; Odenhausen, left half; Westmoreland, right half; and Braden, fullback. Substitutes were Balas, Handley, Beard and Thomas. Playing the same position as named for Bellville, were Barry, Lehman, Phillips, Fisher, Lindemann, St. John, Woolst, Smith, McNutt, Long and Zapolac.
