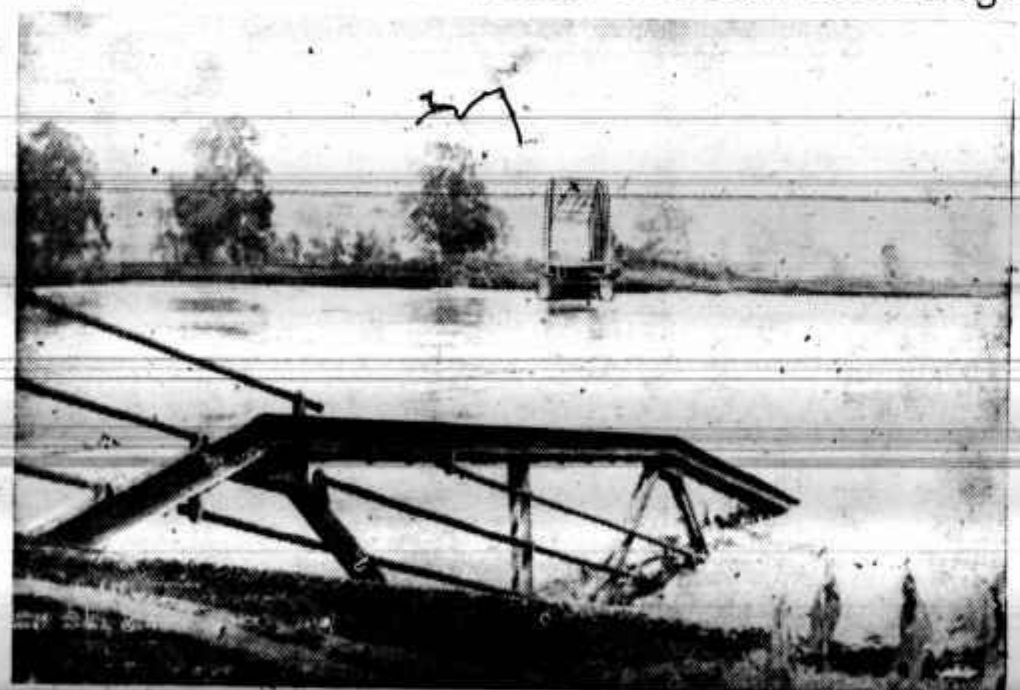

SANTA FE RAILROAD PLANS ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN

W. H. Graves, local Santa Fe agent, spent several days in Galveston last week in attendance at a conference of railroad officials. The high officials of the company were present at this meeting at which various phases of the railroad's program for business recovery were discussed. Chief among the plans is extensive newspaper advertising. High officials from Chicago urged that all weekly newspapers touched by the lines of the Santa Fe system be used in the advertising schedules.

WEIMAR LANDMARK WILL BE SOLD, PROCEEDS DIVIDED

A controversy on the rightful owners of the Proseim Hall, an old landmark of Weimar, built some 50 years ago, has been settled. The Proseim Verein was organized about the time the hall was built and later reorganized. Many of its charter members have died or moved away and the organization died out. Therefore it was impossible to give a clear title to the remaining property. A compromise was enacted last week in district court when, by order of Judge Holt, the property was ordered sold within the next 18 months and divided in six equal parts to be given to the four Weimar churches, the American Legion and the public school.

FLOODS FORECAST

GARWOOD FREIGHT AND PHONE CONNECTION OUT

When the Garwood bridge went out Saturday morning, Garwood's telephone connection with other lines went out, since the line connecting the exchange at that place with the Southwestern Bell lines in Eagle Lake spanned the river on this bridge.

Freight, too, coming in to Garwood and going out from that town had to cross the bridge to reach the Santa Fe depot. High waters from the river, however, were already over a considerable section of the track through the bottoms and trains were prevented from reaching the station.

Daily mail service to Garwood is routed by Altair, and the mails are being carried to and from Garwood from the Eagle Lake postoffice, by automobile.

The swollen Colorado is not expected to be within its banks before next Tuesday or Wednesday, and until that time, it is said, arrangements can not be made to rebuild the telephone lines across the river to connect with Eagle Lake. Local telephone exchange service in Garwood is not affected by the wash-out.

OLD-TIME PRINTER SETS LAST STRING OF COPY

Willie W. Waterhouse, 75, known to practically every newspaper office in Texas as "Wandering Weary Willie Waterhouse of Walla Walla, Washington," has answered the call of "Thirty."

He was found dead Sunday morning at 9 o'clock in the back east of South Alamo Street in San Antonio by a passerby.

Waterhouse, a retired printer, was a member of the Typographical Union No. 172. He was buried in San Antonio Monday. Death was said to be due to natural causes.

He was one of the few remaining "wandering printers," those who traveled from office to office. He was a native of Texas and lived most of his life in this state. Up to a few years ago, he paid this office a visit twice each year, once in the spring and again in the late fall.

Though classed as the "hobo printer," Waterhouse was very intelligent, and few printing offices in Texas ever turned him down. He was always good for a meal, at least, in any of them.

He and Jack Jordan, another of the old wanderer-jest printers, who died a number of years ago, set up and put together the first press used in the Headlight office in March of 1903.

BROTHER OF MR. LARSON PASSED AWAY IN HOUSTON

The body of Bird Larson, 47 years of age, of Houston, will be brought to Eagle Lake from that city, where he died yesterday, on the 11 o'clock Southern Pacific today, and taken by the McCreary Funeral Company to Rock Island for burial.

Mr. Larson passed away in a Houston hospital Wednesday. He was born in Ruthven, Iowa, and moved with the family to Rock Island in 1906, shortly afterwards moving to Houston where he has since made his home.

He served with the sanitary unit of the medical department overseas during the World War, having been gassed at the battle front, and since the war days had never fully recovered his health.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. G. A. Larson of Smithville, and three brothers, Harry D. Larson of Eagle Lake, Les Larson of San Antonio, and Jeff Larson of Smithville. Funeral services will be held at Rock Island at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Mr. Larson's wife, who survives him, was a former Hempstead girl.

Hottest, Coldest, Wettest

Weather Was Recorded

During The Past Year

A dizzying succession of phenomenal weather—most of it bad—has made the past 12 months one of the most remarkable periods on the Weather Bureau's books, according to reports from Washington, D. C.

In one part of the country or another, weather men have recorded the coldest winter—the hottest summer—the worst floods—the most devastating dust storms and the most severe tornadoes and hurricanes in history.

The central and eastern portions of the country recorded the extremes in temperature during the winter of 1935-1936.

"At Devil's Lake, N. D.," bureau officials said, "there was established a winter temperature record that probably has no parallel in the weather history of this country for a first-order Weather Bureau station. The temperature went below freezing on Nov. 27 and did not rise to the freezing point until March 1, a period of 96 days."

The average temperature for January and February at Devil's Lake was 13 degrees below zero.

It is in this same region where record heat is now being recorded. Within the past week, a report of 112 degrees was received from Devil's Lake, Kennebec, S. D.; recently reported a maximum of 119 degrees.

Temperatures in the Dakotas have ranged around and over 100 degrees for more than a week.

Record snows fell in the northern and central portions of the country, and in the far west, during the winter. In March a rain-storm moved into the east from the south, whereupon eastern rivers went on a rampage, establishing records along the Atlantic seaboard, and bringing about the worst flood in history in the upper Ohio valley, as well as in the March floods.

Floods also struck Texas during May and June, causing widespread damage.

Bad dust storms on the northern Great Plains two years ago moved into the southwest "dust bowl" where earlier this year disastrous winds blew away the top-soil. However, rains in recent weeks brought relief to the dry south-western area.

Heavy loss of life occurred Sept. 2 when a hurricane swept across the Florida Keys, and two other hurricanes affected southern Florida last month. At the time of the worst tropical storm, the bureau obtained a sea level barometer reading of 26.35, "the lowest of record in the Western Hemisphere."

The bureau reported 479 tornadoes in 1935, compared to 147 for 1934. And during the week ending April 8, 1936, "some of the most destructive tornadoes of record occurred in parts of the south-east, especially at Tupelo, Miss. and Athens, Ga."
