NEW APPROACH FOR THE WORLD'S LARGEST CHURCH

In Rome, "magnificent distances" are today a fashion in city architecture. God's stone monuments are being demolished everywhere. Remnants of some of the Borgo district, will let the eye sweep unhindered from the Castle of St. Angelo on the Tiber to the facade of the basilica of St. Peter's. Further plans, long discussed, but not definitely accepted, include the addition of another noble colonnade to those of Bernini partly enclosing St. Peter's plaza.

"Repairing the piazza is already under way," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society. "Visitors disgorged from sightseeing busses in front of the basilica light on a partly torn-up square, noisy with staccato rattling of pneumatic tires as workmen remove ancient blocks before replacing them with cement and stone."

"The large piazza, with its colonnades, is an impressive approach to this holiest shrine of the Catholic world. Two fountains splash there. An 82-foot obelisk, brought from Egypt by Roman conquerors, is one of a dozen piercing Rome's blue sky."

"An observant pilgrim, mounting the twenty-two steps to St. Peter's portico, is certain to notice the celebrated Holy Door. It is a stucco rectangle with a bronze cross set in it, and is coated every quarter century—then walked up between Jubilees. It is closed now. On the Christmas Eve preceding the Jubilee year, 1950, it will be broken again."

"St. Peter's is the largest church in Christendom, covering more than 150,000 square feet. Its immensity is so broken up by the four huge piers supporting the dome, and by many gigantic statues, that some visitors on first entering the nave find they have been more awed by much smaller St. Paul's Cathedral in London, or the Cathedral of Chartres in France."

"Because of the cosmopolitan crowds of pilgrims surging into St. Peter's, the thousands on feast days, as signs on the confessionals indicate."

"Among impressive sculptures adorning the church is Michelangelo's David, a marble statue which most Catholics look to see is that of St. Peter seated, in less than life-size bronze, under a red and gold canopy."

"Around the interior walls are 39 large copies of religious paintings that hang in the Vatican and other galleries. Beautiful shades of blue predominate. From a distance they resemble fine oil paintings. Approaching closer, one sees thousands of tiny pieces of mosaic carefully fitted together. In the center, a papal mosaic figure, visitors may see similar pictures made."

"Among the tombs and memorials of St. Peter is a crypt containing the remains of the pope, who first died to eat a tomato, despite the age-old superstition that tomatoes were poisonous. Thus he gave the world one of its most prized vegetables—The Puttifer."

"I am sure that the thinking men and women in Texas, after the matter is put up to them, will see the justice of the proposed amendment and will talk to their neighbors and will talk it at Sunday school, their lodges and at social gatherings and say a good word to the end that the proposed constitutional amendment will be overwhelmingly carried at the November election, and in this great Centennial year we will have a government that has no fear of the final outcome."
