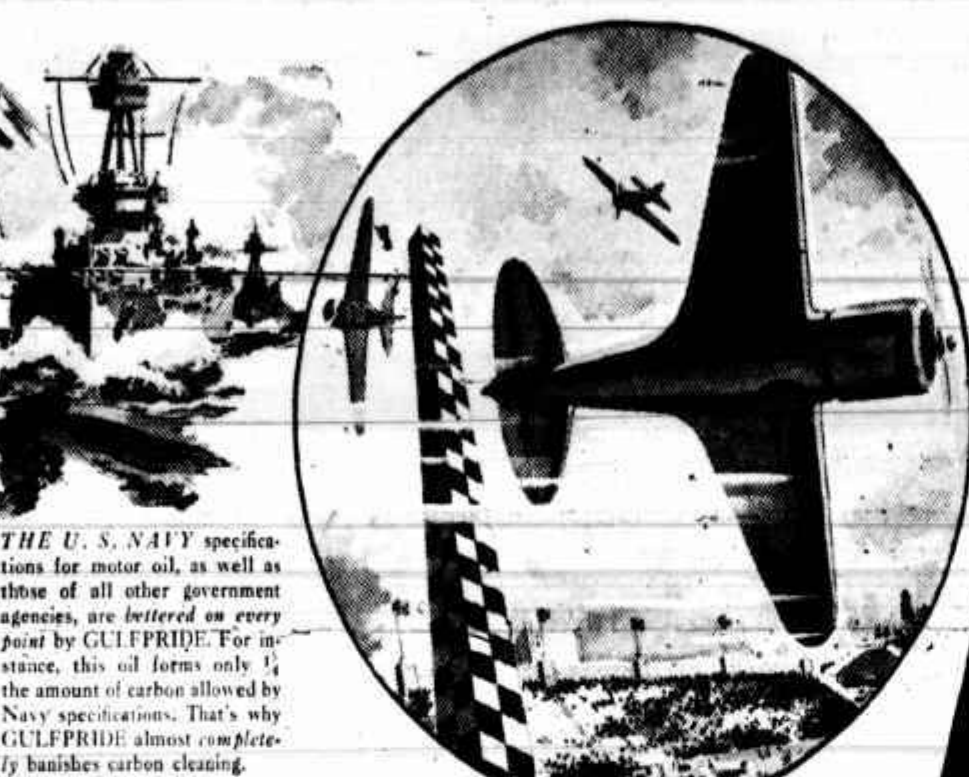

LARGE CONGREGATION HEARS BISHOP QUIN

Christ Episcopal Church was filled
to overflowing last Sunday
morning when a large number of
persons attended service to hear
the Rt. Rev. Clinton S. Quin, Bis-
hop of the Diocese of Texas. A con-
firmation class of five persons was
presented to the Bishop for the
historic rite of the "Laying on of
Hands."

Bishop Quin delivered an inter-
esting and inspiring sermon which
applied to the situation which
faces the modern world. He said
in effect that Christian people need
to replace in their own lives cer-
tain things before they would be
able to find a satisfactory solution
to the world-wide problems of the
day.

"We need to put God back in the
center of our individual lives,"
the Bishop said, "the prevailing
humanitarianism, manifested in the
deeds of the 'Thanksgiving Day
Baker' and the Good Fellow Fund,
are not enough. It will not save
us. We also need to stand for cer-
tain things we know to be right.
Times may change; they have
changed, but there are certain
marks of character which never
change. Purity, honor, courage and
common honesty have always been
virtues in the world and always
will be."

"We need a willingness to sacri-
fice for that which is right. Dis-
cipline must have a place in our
lives if we are to be able to make
balanced judgments upon the prob-
lems confronting us."
