THE WAGE EARNER

BEGINS TO GET HIS

The following is a typical tax notice now being sent out to employees by the employing companies throughout the country.

The Federal Social Security Act passed by Congress and approved by the President of the United States imposes on all employees in the United States, with certain minor exceptions, a tax for Federal Old Age Benefits on wages, salaries, commissions, etc. up to \$3,000 received after December 31, 1936 and until employee reaches the age of 65. This tax applies to both extra labor employees and to regular employees.

The tax shall be at the following rates for the calendar years as shown below:

1. 1 per centum for the years 1937, 1938 and 1939.

2. 1 1/2 per centum for the years 1940, 1941 and 1942.

3. 2 per centum for the years 1943, 1944 and 1945.

4. 2 1/2 per centum for the years 1946, 1947 and 1948.

5. 3 per centum after December 31, 1948.

The law provides that the tax shall be collected by the employer by deducting the amount of the tax from the wages of the employee as and when paid. The amount of the tax so deducted is then paid over to the United States Government by the employer.

A deduction of this tax will therefore, be made from each payroll check for your services rendered on and after January 1, 1936 up to \$3,000.

This information is given you at this time in order that you may be fully informed. For more detailed information concerning the law you are requested to consult your department head, district or local manager.

TOWN OF SIX THOUSAND PEOPLE AND NO TAXES

The unincorporated community of Eagle Lake, with a population of more than 6,000 people has no modern city conveniences but no taxes.

Residents of the town, located in East Harris county and the site of a large oil refinery are served by a modern water system worth around \$30,000. Adequate sewer service is provided through a system valued at more than \$100,000. A \$100,000 storm sewer system provides drainage. A modern garbage collection service is operated as in large cities.

Modern fire protection comes from a system of fire plugs, a \$3,000 fire truck and volunteer department. All thoroughfares have curbs and gutters.

It all costs each property holder \$2 a month.

Telephone service, lights and fuel are bought from utility companies.

The gasless system in Baytown resulted from a community utility company capitalized at \$25,000 ten years ago. It is a non-profit organization.

There are 492 active stockholders. The corporation belongs to the stockholders. When anyone buys a share in Baytown he buys stock in the corporation and when the bill is sold the stock goes with it. Therefore, each lot owner is a stockholder.
