### EXCURSION TRAIN TO DALLAS FAIR SATURDAY

### OLD AGE PENSION CHECKS PROMISED FOR NOV. 1ST

El Campo high school griders are a step nearer the district football championship as a result of their smashing 26 to 0 victory over the Bay City eleven at El Campo Friday.

Slovacek, El Campo back, brought fans to their feet twice with long touchdown gallops. The first was for 80 yards in the second quarter and the other for 30 yards in the final period.

S. George's Weimar Wildcats in an official District 37-B melee Friday. Thereafter the game was fought on almost even terms.

Following their 25 to 12 victory over Wharton Friday, Coach Charles Bowden's Richmond High School Tigers started priming Monday for their test against Eagle Lake at Richmond tonight. The Eagles are fed up on losing games and are going to Richmond tonight with the determination to "hold them tight."

The Richmond Tigers are said to have shown real championship form against Wharton when they came from behind to score all of their points in the final quarter. Going into the fourth period, Wharton held a 12 to 0 lead, but the Richmond boys opened and raced over four touchdowns. George Reading, Leon Vorphal, Emmett Shannon and George Horak crossed the Wharton goal line, with Shannon starring with his brilliant kicking.

In a game played in rain and cold weather, the Flatonia Bulldogs defeated the Schulenburg Short-horns Friday night by a score of 21 to 0. First score came after the Bulldogs blocked a punt on the inside of the Short-horns' 20-yard line. Flatonia scored again in the second quarter. The third score came late in the third quarter after Flatonia had intercepted a Short-horn pass and returned to the 20-yard line. Schulenburg plays Weimar at Schulenburg today.

### WILLIE BEUCHMANN WILL HAVE PUBLIC SALE ON 7TH

### CANNING PLANTS AND SEWING ROOMS RECORDS

Mrs. Mae G. Ammann, county supervisor for canning plants and sewing rooms, shows in her report, the vast amount of money the Government has expended in this county for the work done through these two projects, both of which are sponsored by the commissioners' court of Colorado county.

Mrs. Ammann's report shows that from November 22nd, 1935, to October 22, 1936, a total of \$2,629 cents of fruits, vegetables and meats were turned out in the canning plants of the county, and for the work the Government has expended \$9,089.68 for canning plant wages in the county.

During the same period, there were 14,531 garments made at the various sewing rooms of the county, and in the sewing room project the Government has expended \$12,782.00 in salaries.

The total amount of money brought into the county on these two projects is \$21,871.00, according to Mrs. Ammann's report to the commissioners' court.

division of our city, or state governments? How many of us know the amount of the money raised from the different revenue-raising sources of the governments?

An attempt to answer these questions should leave little doubt as to how much, or rather how little, we actually know about the finances of our government. A fundamental basis of democratic government is the periodic accounting of money expended.

Such an accounting should come about by periodic publication of financial statements where everyone could read them—in the newspapers of the state. A government's duty is primarily toward its stockholders. There is a need for the public enlightenment in government finances. Our state legislature could, do itself proud by passing such a law during its next regular session, starting next January. —Fredericksburg Standard.

### BLOWING BUBBLES

Most youngsters like to blow bubbles with a bubble pipe or soda-water straw. They have lots of fun trying to blow the biggest bubbles, but with ordinary soapy water only small ones can be blown. Frequently the bubble pipe or straw is blamed for failure to blow big bubbles. Usually, however, it is not the fault of the pipe. The secret of good bubble blowing is in the mixing of the bubble water solution. To blow big bubbles, the kind that will float away in the air, make the bubble solution very soapy, then add a teaspoonful of ordinary glycerine. With such a solution every bubble blower will be certain to have success.
